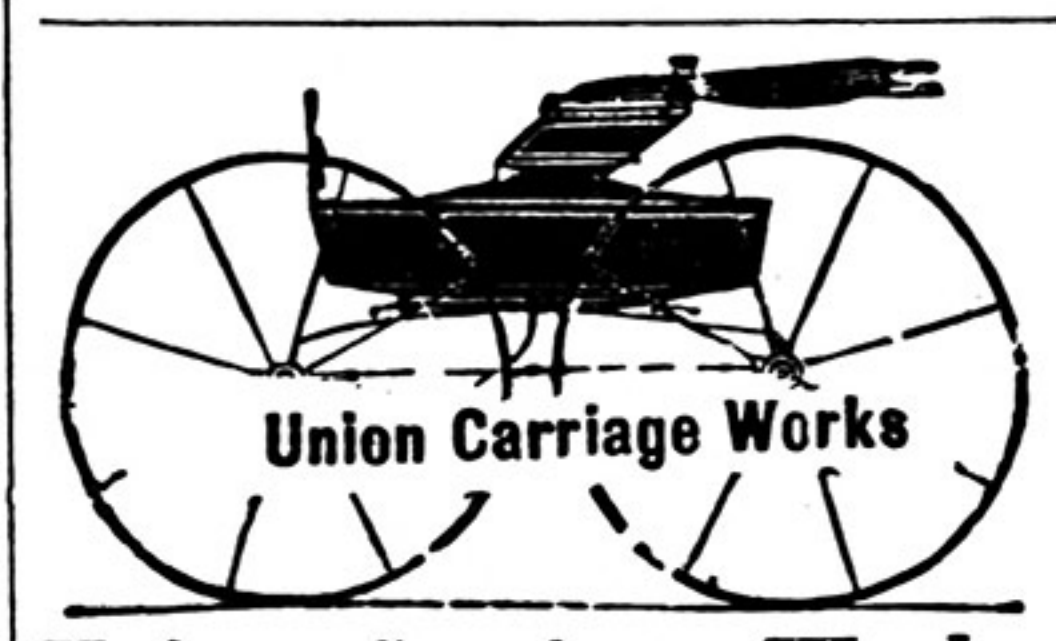

for Flesherston Cheese Factory com-
mences the 7th of May. Ephriam,
Brodie has secured the contract for
this section.

EUPHRASIA COUNCIL.
A meeting of the Township Council of the
Township of Euphrasia was held pursuant to
adjournment on the 6th day of April 1883.
Members present, the Reeve, Deputy-reeve
and Mr. James C. Paterson.
Minutes of last session of Council read
and confirmed.
Thomas Jordan's time for returning his
roll was extended until the June council
meeting.
A petition signed by Richard Carefoot and
twelve others praying for the opening of 6 &
7 side road laid over until next meeting of
council.
The Clerk was ordered not to place any
arrears of taxes against the E. 1/2 of lot 6,
con. 1, as it was made to appear, that no
arrears is due thereon.
The sum of \$3 was erased from the taxes
charged against the W. 1/2 of lot 6 concession
9, said amount being charged in error.
The reeve was appointed to negotiate with
Mr. McKenny, concerning land for deviation
road at lot 11 con. 1.
The Treasurer was ordered to remit to A.
B. Fawcett of the Flesherston Advance \$6.46
being the amount which this Township is en-
titled to pay for advertising notice of devia-
tion road, in lieu of part of the town line be-
tween Euphrasia and Artemesia.
The Treasurer was instructed to remit to
J. G. Sing, Esq., P. L. S the sum of \$27 for
surveying up to date as per account ren-
dered.
The Treasurer was authorized to receive
from James Lyons, the sum of \$9.40 charg-
ed against N. 1/2 of lot No. 11, con. 12, and
the clerk ordered to request the County
Treas. to strike this off his books.
The Reeves orders were issued on the
Treas. to pay as follows, viz: Joseph Kaake,
\$6.60 for part furnished for road purposes;
Robert Dunlop, Clerk, \$40, part salary for
the current year; Joseph Manary \$55, salary
as collector in 7 westerly concessions for
1882; Abraham Holden, \$1.50, for repairing
road scraper; William McConnell, \$50 cents
for assisting the mail carrier on the 4th line.
