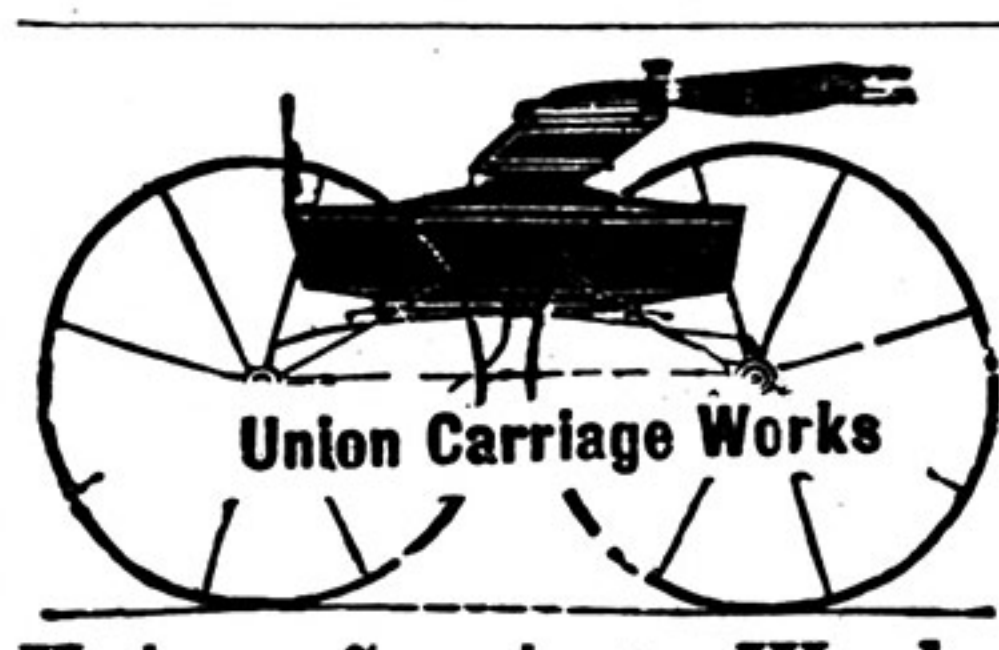

Mr. R. Ninnons had a very fine piano ship-  
ped to his own address last week and as there

Wolseley excels in good water, abundance  
of wood, best land in the North-West Terri-  
tory, and beautiful scenery, as we are only
