Council met in the Town Hall, on Monday, April 2nd, 1883.

Present Messrs. Christoe, Elliott, Wright, McArthur and McKee.

Minutes of March session read and approved.

Communications as follows presented and read.

J. L. Moore re lots 185 and 186, 1st East. Joseph Buchanan re Petition enclosed Angus McDonald stating that he would not act as pathmaster.

Petitions presented and read as follows, R. Smith et al asking council to pass a by-law to prevent hogs from running at large.

David Foster, et al, re 110 side road, 2nd con. East.

Wm. Knight, et al, asking the council to take steps to have trees planted in accordance with the Ontario Tree Planting Act.

Duncan Muir, et al, re opening road between 205rd con. N. D. R., at lots 21.

Accounts as follows, presented and read: W. H. Campaign, flour to Moses Sherwood; W. J. Bellamy, quarter salary; Postage account to date; Richardson's for stationary; A. R. Fawcett, Printing, &c.

By-law no. 352, appointing pathmaster was read a third time, and passed.

Wright, Elliott, that the request of J. L. Moore be granted and that any of the other parties in similar circumstances be released, and upon the said parties presenting release deeds for signature, the Reeve and Trustee (or proper executing parties) are hereby authorized to sign the same, carried.

McArthur, Wright, that the petition of David Foster, et al, be referred to a committee, viz.: Messrs. Christoe and Elliott, committee to report at next session of council, carried.

Wright, McArthur, that the petition of R. Smith, et al, be laid over until next session of council, and that a notice be published in the Advance, that this council then pass a By-law to prohibit sheep and hogs from running at large, carried.

Elliott, McArthur, that Geo. Lowles be paid \$2.50, in accordance with a resolution of council of 1880, and that John McKechnie be refunded \$2, being statute labour returned against his lot in Priceville Village, carried.

McArthur, Wright, that the following accounts be paid: M. Richardson, \$4.03; A. R. Fawcett, printing, 88; W. J. Bellamy, salary, \$47.50; Postage account to date, \$2.50, carried.

McArthur, Wright, that one half of A. R. Fawcett's account for advertising town line deviation between Euphrasia, and this township be paid, carried.

McArthur, Wright, that Wm. Hacking be refunded 50 cts, being error in assessment, carried.

Council adjourned.
