BUFFALO, N. Y., June 10.—Saturday's meeting closed the eleventh annual session of the Supreme Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen. A vote was taken on the place of holding the next annual meeting and Toronto was selected by the following ballot:—Toronto 116, Chicago 44, St. Louis 15. A motion to reconsider was defeated by 108, to 64, the majority determining to test the famous hospitality of the beautiful Canadian Queen City.

LORD LANSDOWNE.

MOVEMENTS OF OUR NEXT GOVERNOR-GENERAL.

The London World of May 30, says: The Marquis and Marchioness of Lansdowne are staying at Bewood, and will come to town a short time this season. Lord Lansdowne took a week to decide whether he would accept the Government of Canada. His family and friends all advised him to do so. It is no secret that his income has been most seriously diminished by the antient agitation in Ireland, as his vast estates in Kerry are the backbone of the family possessions. He owns 125,000 acres in Ireland, and only 11,000 in England. Lord Lansdowne was in town for two days last week, and had interviews with Mr. Gladstone, Lord Grenville, and Lord Derby.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

Council met in the Town Hall on 4th inst pursuant to adjournment.

All the members present.

Davis, Dunsmoor, that a special grant of \$78, be made to assist in opening the base line on the West side of lot 2 con. 13, the Reeve to let the contract and superintend the work. Carried.

Dunsmoor, McMillan, that John Murdoch be paid one dollar for repairing culvert at lot 7. con. 1, E. G. R., and Wm. Thomas \$12 for work on base line at lot 1, con. 2. Carried.

Mullarky, McMillan, that Thos. McAsey be paid \$4 for repairing road at lot 15 con. 8. Carried.

Dunsmoor, McMillan, that Joseph Lamb's account amounting to 85 cents be paid. Carried.

Davis, Dunsmoor, that \$20 be granted to the Town line between Glenelg and Egremont commencing at the base line lot 1 running East providing Egremont grants an equivalent for the same place. Carried.

McMillan, Mullarky, that \$30 be granted to open the town line between Glenelg and Egremont opposite lot 23, providing that Egremont grant the same amount for the same place. Carried.

Davis, Mullarky, that G. McRae be granted \$9 to pay the hand that assisted him in saving the bridge at Purdy's Mill. Carried.

Dunsmoor, Davis, that \$40 be granted for the town line between Glenelg and Holland, at lot 1, on 1st, 2nd and 3rd con.'s E. G. R., providing Holland grants an equivalent for the same place. Carried.

Davis, McMillan, that Mr. Mullarky be authorized to repair the bridge at lot 101 W T. R. Carried.

Davis, Mullarky, that \$40 be granted for repairing road at lots 11 to 15 inclusive on 13th con. Carried.

Dunsmoor, Davis, that Mr. Jinkens be paid \$2.00 for advertising. Carried.

Davis, Dunsmoor, that the following sums be granted for the improvement of roads and bridges:—Ward No. 1, \$70; Ward No. 2, \$70; Ward No. 3, \$100; Ward No. 4, \$80. Carried.

Davis, McMillan, that Chas. McArthur be refunded \$5.22 taxes for 1882. Carried.

Davis, Mullarky, that the Reeve, Mr. McMillan, and the mover be a committee to let and inspect the building of a bridge at lot 44, con. 3, N. D. R. Carried.

Council adjourn to meet at the same place on 20th August next.

Township Hall Euphrasia, June 1, '83. This Council met as a Court of Revision, at 10 o'clock a. m., on the above date.

Guthrie's assessment confirmed; Robert Orr's assessment confirmed; James Gilray's assessment reduced \$100; James Gardiner's assessment confirmed; John Bradley's assessment reduced \$100; John Bradley assessed for the whole of lot 6, con. 3; James Stinson's assessment confirmed; Andrew Grier assessed for E½ lot 6, con. 2; Ben. McKenzie assessed for blacksmithshop, and lot in Kimberley; Jas. Paterson assessed for W½ of W½ lot 30, con. 9 instead of Thos. Douglas; James McLung assessed for N½ of lot 20, con. 2, instead of Robert Guardhouse; Joseph Sherwood assessed for N½ of lot 5, in the 3rd concession; Joseph Hawken assessed as tenant for N½ lot 4, in the 5th concession; Abraham Tay or as a set for S½ of lot 29 in the 4th concession; Nelson Laird assessed for W½ of lot 6, in con. 9 at \$600; John and Thos. The requisition of Rev. T. Rennie and others in reference to the improvement of 27 & 23 side roads in the 11th & 12th concessions entertained an Mr. Boyd and Mr. Pater on, appointed a committee, to examine said roads, and report at next meeting of Council.

A petition asking for improvement on 9 & 10 side line in the 7th & 8th concessions laid over for further consideration.

The amount of \$60 was granted to be expended on the 11th line at lot 15.

The Reeve, Clerk and Mr. Paterson were appointed to examine the assessment roll.

Mr. Jordan's time for returning his roll was extended until the 18th inst., on account of his recent illness.

The petition of Wm. Paterson, and others laid before Council asking improvement, on Southerly end of 3rd line, and the Reeve and Mr. Ellis appointed to investigate this matter, and also to examine the blind line between the 3rd & 4th concession at lot 2, and report at next meeting of council.

The Treasurer was ordered to remit to Mr. Rutledge, printer Markdale, \$38, for printing up to date.

The Reeve's orders were issued on the Treasurer as follows, viz:—

SANITARIUM.

The present season has set in with sunshine and showers, and sultry heat, which health departments say are conducive to human ailments. The food we eat is an important factor in the preservation of health. Our sanitary laws are efficient for incorporated towns and cities. Most people think that in the country all is pure and healthy; so it is, as far as the gifts of God are concerned, where wicked humanity has not the power to adulterate. Some years ago a rigid investigation was made by the sanitary commission of New York as to the quality of the milk supplied to the public of that city, and a chemical analysis proved that out of home seven hundred samples tested, only five were found pure. New York has its counterpart— even worse than the evil-milk of that notorious city—in your little town of Markdale. A fashionable hotel in your village, where the most fastidious of your clerks and traveling public resort, have a cow to supply the table with milk. The poor animal has contracted disease, and has a running sore in the jaw—a monster ulcer—the size of a pail yet the milk from this diseased animal is supplied to the boarders and guests, thus feeding a putrid substance which cannot fail to bring about fatal results, but we are told the cautious landlady purchases her milk for personal use, from a neighbor.
