OBITUARY.

Amongst the many bereavements by death of late, we have to chronicle the demise of Mr. Chas. Currie, of the South line, Artemesia, on the 22nd ult., at the age of 97 years. Deceased was a native of Islay, Argyllshire, Scotland. He emigrated to Canada in 1874, settling in the township of Chingacousy. In 1851 he with his numerous family removed to Glenelg, in this county in the vicinity of Priceville, and lately to his late residence. Deceased was one in whom the spirit of true Christian charity and benevolence abounded in an eminent degree, and his memory will long remain green and fresh in the hearts of the many who knew his benevolence. His remains were followed to their last resting place in the Presbyterian Cemetery, Priceville, on the 24th by a large assemblage of sorrowing relatives and friends.

HOLLAND COUNCIL.

Holland Centre, June 8 1883.

Council of the Township of Holland, met as an adjourned Court of Revision. Reeve in the chair. Members all present. Minutes of former meeting read and confirmed. The following persons were placed on the Roll, J. W. Eagle, Patton & Johnston, Amos J. Merim, Wm. Vogan, Robt. McNally, and Robt. Telfour. Galbraith, Deavitt, that the Court of Revision now close, and that the Assessment Roll as it now stands, be confirmed and engrossed on the minutes.

Holland Centre, June 8, 1883.

Council met at one o'clock for the transaction of general business.

The committee appointed to investigate the repairing and building certain bridges, gave in their report.

Galbraith, Deputy Reeve, that the clerk be instructed to notify the pathmaster of Walter's Falls to request Dr. McClelland to remove all obstructions off the street opposite his place in Walter's Falls, otherwise the law in that respect will have to be put in force.

McKinnet, Deputy Reeve, that an order be issued in favor of Mrs. Graham for \$5.00, on the application of John Price, and that he be instructed to give the same to her.

Galbraith, Deavitt, that the By-law for the purpose of dividing the Township into 5 polling sub divisions be read 1st 2nd & 3rd time and engrossed on the minutes.

Galbraith, McKinnet, that the resolution of Glenelg Council, granting \$40.00 for repairing town like between the two Townships, be supplemented by a similar grant from this Township, and to be placed opposite the 1st 2nd & 3rd concession.

Galbraith, Deavitt, that \$500 be expended on the roads of the Township this year in the following appointments: West Ward, \$100; South \$100; East \$100; North \$120; Centre \$100.

Shute, Deavitt, that the sum of \$3.00 be expended in buying timber to make culvert on Toronto Line near Railroad.

A petition presented by Angus Gunn and signed by 20 others praying for a grant to open up 3 con., from No. 30 to Hamilton's mill.

Shute, Galbraith, that the prayer of the above petition be granted by giving \$30.

Deavitt, Deputy Reeve, that the Council appoint themselves road commissions for this year.

Deavitt, Shute, that Mr. Galbraith take the South Ward, Mr. Shute the North, Mr. Cameron the West, Mr. McKinnet the East, Mr. Deavitt the Centre.

Deavitt, Deputy Reeve, that Mr. Galbraith be instructed to act in accordance with the committee report with respect to bridge on 2nd con. and get 4 men to repair the same.

Galbraith, Deavitt, that Messrs. Shute, McKinnet be appointed to examine certain bridges in the township as to the state of repair, and to report at next meeting of Council.

Galbraith, Shute, that we adjourn till the 29th July.

ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.

FLESHERTON, June 4th, 1883.

Artemesia Council met to-day as a Court of Revision on the assessment of 1883.

Members present: Messrs. Christie Elliott, Wright, McArthur and McKee. After each member had made and subscribed the necessary oath as a member of said court, the court was duly opened, when the following appeals were heard and other business disposed of:

Appeal No. 1, Peter Holman, assessment reduced \$100; 2, Alex. Brown, assessment sustained; 3, John Bullivant, appeal dismissed; 4, W. H. Campaign, appeal dismissed; 5, Josiah Gamey, assessment reduced \$50; 6, Samuel Pedlar, appeal dismissed; 7, Thomas Wyville, assessment reduced \$200; 8, James Stewart, appeal dismissed. Wm. Walker was assessed on R. Roll for lot 31, con. 11, at \$400; Thomas J. Stinson was assessed as farmer's son lots 178 and 179, 1st West; Wm. Patton was assessed for lot 16, 3 S. D. R., at \$750; Robert Patton assessed for S. 14, 2, S. D. R. at \$500; T. Atchison assessed for lot 39, con. 7, instead of William Atchison; John McMorrisson assessed for lot 127, 2nd East, at \$400; Thos. Gamey assessed for West part 37, con. 7, 36 acres, at \$180; George Dod's assessed for lots 4 and 5, South John Ste. Bell's survey, at \$160.

Elliott, McArthur, that the assessment roll of the township of Artemesia, as now arranged and corrected by the Court of Revision, be certified by the Clerk as the roll for all purposes for the year 1883.

Court of Revision rose and sat again as a council meeting.

Minutes of May session read and approved of.

Communications as follows presented and read.

Geo. Wright & Bro. re bridges; Clerk of Osprey, re expending \$10 on the town line Osprey and Artemesia; Fred Gee asking to be exempted from statute labor for the current year; an application from the trustees of S. S. No. 7, to have debentures to the amount of \$1,250 for building a new school house in said section; an application from trustees of S. S. No. 4, to borrow \$45 until the levy in said section this fall; petition of Alex. Brown et al re bridge on the Durham road, Priceville Village, and a petition of Alex. Kinner, et al re opening sideroad 35 between the 13th and 14th concessions, and the repairing of town line Euphrasia and Artemesia were presented and read.

Accounts as follows presented and read: John Whitby, salary and postage as assessor, \$82; A. Elliott, service on committee re Priceville bridge, \$4; Mrs. Thompson, bread to Boyles and Taylor \$13.37; by-law No. 355 to amend by-law 353 appointing municipal officers, and by-law 356 to authorize a loan to S. S. No. 7 were introduced and read a first time.

Elliott, Wright, that by-law No. 355 be read a second time. Carried.

Elliott, McArthur, that by-law No. 356 be read a second time. Carried.

Elliott, Wright, that by-law No. 355 be read a third time, signed, sealed, and entered in by-law book. Carried.

McArthur, Wright, that by-law No. 356 be now read a third time, signed, sealed and entered in by-law book. Carried.

Wright, McKee, that the application of the trustees school section No. 4 for a loan of \$45, until their rate be collected be entertained, and that the Reeve issue order for same. Carried.

Wright, Elliott, that in accordance with request of the township of Osprey this council expend the sum of ten dollars on township line between Artemesia and Osprey, at the place named by Osprey, and that councillor McKee attend to the matter. Carried.

McArthur, Wright, that the commissioner for ward No. 2 be instructed to act with commissioner from Euphrasia in building bridge over saugeen river on town line Artemesia and Euphrasia. Carried.

Elliott, Wright, that this council will expend fifty dollars on bridge over saugeen river on the old Durham, R. in the Village of Priceville, provided the people of Priceville make up the balance of cost of erecting the same, or the councillor for the ward meet the cost over fifty dollars out of his appropriation. All the timber in the old bridge fit for use to be utilized in new structure, said bridge to be let by tender or to the lowest bidder, the commissioner for the ward to let and superintend the work. Carried.

Wright, McKee, that the reeve and deputy reeve be and are hereby instructed to make application to the County Council of the county of Grey, at its session at Owen Sound on the fourth Monday in June 1883, to appoint a committee to enquire into and report upon the amount to be expended by the municipalities of Artemesia and Glenelg on townline between said townships from ninety sideroad north of Markdale, to 110 sideroad South. Carried.

Elliott, Wright, that Fredrick Gee be exempt from statute labor for 1883 on account of ill health. Carried.

McKee, McArthur, that the following accounts be paid: Mrs. Thompson, bread to Boyles and Taylor, \$13.37; John Whitby, salary as assessor, \$82; indigents monthly allowance, \$10; this day session, \$12. Carried.

Elliott, Wright, that this council meet on Saturday, July 7th, 1883, instead of Monday, 2nd July 1883, and that the clerk give notice of change.
