'IMMIGRANT CHILDREN.'—Mr. John T. Middlemore, the founder of the Orphan Children's Emigration Charity, London Ont., left Liverpool on the 7th inst., in the S. S. Circassian, with a party of 50 girls and 80 boys between the ages of 3 and 15 years. They are brought out to this country for adoption or hire, chiefly among farmers. They are expected to arrive at the Guthrie Home, near this city, on or about the 20th inst. This will be Mr. Middlemore's 11th annual visit to these shores with juvenile emigrants from Birmingham, England, since 1873. ### SERIOUS AFFAIR.

A MAN SHOT IN THE LEGS BY HIS NEIGHBOR AT BAUSTER'S LAKE, WHILE FISHING.

The above lake is situated about half a mile north of the Collingwood road, at a distance three miles South of Singhampton, and covers some 70 acres of land, being about all on the property of Mr. Wm. Brewster. It appears Brewster has cultivated speckled trout in this beautiful lake, which in former years was entirely without such, hence considered that he had the undivided control of the fishing in said water. It appears David Johnston, whose farm adjoins the lake, and part of which is said to be on his property, went fishing on Monday the 11th, when Brewster fired a shot in the direction of him, the shot taking effect in Johnston's legs, the wounds are not likely to prove serious. Johnston had Brewster arrested, and he was conveyed to Owen Sound jail, last Thursday, to await his trial. He was admitted out the following day on bail.
