COUNTY COUNCIL.
(Continued from last week.)
Wednesday, June 27th, 2 p. m.
Mr. McKechnie Chairman of Finance
Committee, presented Report No. 1 of the
same, which on motion was adopted.
The Reeve of Durham presented By-laws
317 and 318 to meet the current expenses
and liabilities for the year 1883, as also to
levy a rate for the current year, which was
read a first and second time, when the Coun-
cil went into committee of the whole on the
same, Mr. Christie in the chair.
Committee rose and reported By-laws
316, 317 and 318 without amendment; after
which the Council resumed, the Warden in
the chair.
THURSDAY, June 28th.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. All
the members present.
The Warden presented Report of School
Inspector for North Grey.
MacRae, McKechnie, That this Council hold
no session in December next, it having been
discovered that the usual December session
is no longer needed, owing to the discontin-
uation of granting aid to the County gravel
roads, and whereas by doing away with the
December session a saving to the County of
over \$800 can be accomplished, be it there-
fore resolved that this Council hold no other
session than the present June session for
the current year, provided always that the
Warden be authorized to call a special meet-
ing of the Council in the event of any ur-
gent or any unforeseen business, and that
the usual grants to the Warden and Chair-
men of the committees be made at this ses-
sion.
After a lengthy discussion on the above
motion it was lost on a division of 27 to 10.
Mr. Chisholm read a communication from
the Town Inspector of Owen Sound relative
to the unsafe state of the bridge across the
Pottawatamie River.
Mr. Cameron as Chairman of Road and
Bridge Committee presented his report No. 1
of the same which was adopted.
Mr. Christie, as Chairman of County Prop-
erty Committee, presented his report no 1 of
the same, which was adopted.
7 p. m.—All the members present. The
Warden in the chair.
Mr. Hewgill, Chairman of Educational
Committee, presented his report of the same
which was adopted.
The second Deputy-Reeve of Collingwood
introduced By-law No. 319 to assess the dif-
ferent municipalities in the County of Grey,
for an amount at least equivalent to the legis-
lative school grant for the year 1883.
On motion the Council went into Com-
mittee of the whole on the same, Mr. Chris-
tie in the chair.
By-law No. 319 was filled up in Committee
of the whole, when the Council resumed,
the Warden in the chair.
MacRae, Mullarky, That the Treasurer be
requested to furnish this Council to-morrow
with a statement showing the arrears of each
municipality, if any, to this Council, up to
and including the 31st day of May last, on
account of the various By-laws and County
rates.—Carried.
Mr. McKechnie presented report of the
same, which was adopted with amendment
of committee of the whole.
FRIDAY, June 29th.

The members all present. The Warden
in the Chair.
Mr. Frost, Chairman of Printing Comm-
tee, presented his report No. 1 of the same
which was adopted.
The Deputy-Reeve of Ardenia gave
notice that he would at the December ses-
sion apply for a memorial to be presented to
the Ontario Legislature praying for an Act
to amend Sub section 87, chap. 204, Statute
of Ontario.
On motion made and seconded the Coun-
cil adjourned till third Wednesday in Decem-
ber.—Advertiser.
