A terrific thunder storm passed over this place Wednesday morning accompanied with high winds heavy rain and hail. Another pour came down about six in the evening.

Mr. Lucas, Banker, has purchased the Flesherton steam sash and door machinery from Mr. Hooper, he has also bought the Dufferin Hall Markdale, from J. H. Hull, and will convert it into a Sash & Door Factory. This will be quite an acquisition to our village, the building is well suited for such a factory.

Since the Dufferin Hall has been sold and will be used for other purposes, there will be a public hall required, there is also a skating rink wanted. We would suggest that some of our townsmen build a rink with a hall above it. An investment of \$1,000 in this way would bring a rent of \$200 a year without any difficulty.

MAGISTRATES COURT.—On Monday Mr. Jas. Free, a farmer in Holland Tp. who is also a sheep buyer, appeared before Messrs. Brown & Elliott, J. P.'s on a charge of stealing four sheep from Jas. Lyons, of Euphrasia. It would appear from the evidence that Lyons' sheep were on the road or in an open field and became mixed up with the drove while passing along the road. Mr. Free has, however, to stand his trial at Assizes, and gave bail for his appearance at said court.

Reports to hand show Saturday's storm to have been unusually severe. Barns and dwellings are struck by lightning and destroyed with all their contents. The heavy rain caused the rivers to rise rapidly, carrying away dams, bridges, and whatever obstacles impeded the overwhelming rush of water, and utterly ruining the crops in low lying places. Fortunately but one fatality is reported so far—that of a young man who lost his life while endeavouring to save his employer's property.

The T. G. & B. Railway employees annual picnic, will take place at Shelburne, on Saturday next, 25th. There will be games for which \$400 will be given in prizes. The citizens Brass band of Owen Sound and Prof. H. Lubar's Union Brass and Silver Cornet Band will be in attendance. Tickets from all stations and return only 40 cents, children under 12, 20 cents. Excursion train leaves Owen Sound at 7 a.m., and leaves Shelburne on the return trip, at 6.30 p.m.

The disaster which has befallen the Methodist church of Canada has given opportunity for the manifestation of a most kindly spirit on the part of the M. E. church. Before the ashes of the church had ceased smoking, an offer was made of the use of the M. E. building for the C. M. services, once every Sabbath, in the evening and in the morning alternately. On Monday the Official Board and the Trustee Board unanimously accepted it, expressing in the strongest terms their appreciation of a most brotherly and generous act.

The first C. M. service will be held at 6.30 p.m. on Sunday next. Both congregations will worship together in the public services, but the church organizations will necessarily be distinct as to membership and finance to the end of the year. The C. M. Sabbath school meets at 9 a.m. The bible classes are to be united and meet on Tuesday. It meets on Friday at 1.45 p.m. for this week. The prayer meetings are to be held in one united service. *Mafra Monitor.*



