MARKDALE AT THE INDUSTRIAL TRIAL.

Between prize horse flesh and new patent inventions, Markdale made a very creditable and profitable exhibit at the late Toronto Industrial Exhibition. Mr. J. R. Trimble's horse, "Clear Grit, Jr." won first prize and diploma for roadster stallion, being the highest award possible to take. Mr. Trimble is one of the best horse-men in the country and it is a credit to the place to have such an enterprising man in our village, while it is profitable to the surrounding country to have horse flesh improved by the introduction of good stock.

Messrs. Rae & Irving, of this place, had their new invention also on exhibition. This new idea was invented by Mr. J. G. Irving, pumpmaker, of this place, and was patented June 21st, 1883 and is called "Irving's Patent Valve." It is made of rubber, is attached below the lowest valve in a pump, and is calculated to hinder any obstruction being drawn up with the water that would stick in the valve causing the pump to lose its priming. The invention was pronounced by experienced pump manufacturers at the exhibition to be without a fault, and wondered at its simplicity and why they did not conceive the idea before. The invention was awarded a diploma, and is certain to prove a valuable improvement to the pump business, while it cannot fail to be highly remunerative to our fellow citizens who are handling it. One of them would not accept \$5,000 for his share in the concern.

Mr. Wm. Sargent's Patent Load Lifter was an object of considerable attraction. A large number have been in use present season through Caledon York, Markham, Vaughan, and other townships in that district, and those who have used them (who ought to be the best judges) were unanimous in speaking in the highest terms of satisfaction with which this new invention did its work. Mr. Sargent has also attended the Guelph and London fairs, and has been successful all round in receiving high commendations from the judges. There was no prize for this new invention, so that the highest award available was in the shape of being highly commended. The patentee, Mr. Sargent, has cleared this season alone in the neighborhood of \$10,000 from his patent.

South Grey Exhibition.

The annual show of the S. G. Agricultural Society came off on Tuesday and Wednesday last and was fairly attended. The display of horses and other stock was fully ahead of former years. Poultry was fairly represented, but field produce was rather slim, no doubt, owing to the lateness of the season, and early frosts. Fruit and garden vegetables were good, although not so numerous as we would like to see. Flowers, were very nice, and a slight improvement. The ladies' work was also improved, and the articles displayed were testefully prepared, and showed that they were not just brought out to catch prizes where there was no competition. The chief exhibitors in ladies work were Mrs. Milner who is always to the fore; Mrs. Dr. Jamieson, who is a new resident amongst us, and we hope she will be on hand on future occasions; Miss Mookler and others. The articles, which we think most worthy of note were two fine Percheron horses, by Yost and McAllear; a set of furniture by Geo. Kress; and a cone-work miniature horse by Mrs. Milner. But a look at the prize list will show who the exhibitors and prize takers were. As is usual a few "soaps" vendors and other swindlers were on hand and some fools actually potronized them. Surely people will learn in time, and give all such individuals a wide berth. Everything passed off very satisfactory and with little disturbance. There are a few things we would like to see improved, among which, would be better prizes for field roots, which are not half what they should be, a little more encouragement to fine arts, and a few classes for rare flowers and plants dropped and the prizes improved for the more common varieties. As far as we have seen and heard the Judges' decisions were satisfactory.—

Glencly Fall Show.

This show was held in Markdale, on the 27th and 28th Sept. The weather was exceedingly cold rendering it very uncomfortable for those attending.
