

East Grey Exhibition."

The annual Fall Exhibition of the East Grey Agricultural Society was held at Flesherton last week, and considering the many drawbacks which farmers have had to contend with this year, was a grand success. The articles exhibited in the hall were placed in position the first day and prizes awarded On Wednesday the live stock were taken to the show and judged. The attendance was large and much interest was displayed by the spectators in viewing the various classes of horses and cattle as they were judged during the day.

The show of horses was very good and shows that increasing interest is being taken in raising good horses in the County of Grey There was a large number of thoroughbred and grade cattle, many of them very fine animais, and show a marked improvement on former years. The show of sheep, pigs and fowl was excellent. There was a fine display of buggies, carriages, wagons and agricultural implements. Although the day was chilly there was several thousand peodle on the grounds during the day.

In the Society's large Hall was a magnifi-

cent display in the various classes. All along one side was arranged the several classes of grain, and it was quite a surprise to many to see the superior quality of the exhibits in this class, and the large number of bags shown. Bath fall and spring wheat were exceedingly good. The bartey was very fine in color. Oats and peas were good, The display of roots was very fine, particularly in onions, carrots, potatoes, celery and turnips. In dairy produce there was a good display. The display in fruit and flowers was very fine. Apples, pears and plums were shown in great variety and occupied nearly the whole of one side of the centre table in the hall. Messrs. Doll & Brown of this place showed in a fine glass case a very handsome assortment of watches and jewellery, which was much admired. Mr. John Gordon, of Flesherton showed several sets of neatly made and substantial harness. Mr. Hamilton, of Markdale, and Bulmer, of Flesherton had on exhibition fine assortments of photographs. The former taking first prize. There has generally been on Exhibition at the Earst Grey Show a number of fine drawings and paintings, but the display of works of art in this class this year is something remarkable, and some very beautiful drawings were on exhibition that would be a credit to any artist, The display of Ladies' Work and domestic manufacturers were very fine, and many of the samples exhibited were exceedingly neat and well done.

We congratulate the society in their continued success, having labored together with a will, in purchasing grounds, erecting a suitable hall and fence, and otherwise working for the prosperity of the society they now enjoy the satisfaction of having the leading Exhibition in the county.
