Change in Railway officials.

One of the results of the late amalgamation of the Toronto, Grey, and Bruce Railway with the Ontario and Quebec is the resignation from the former of Mr. Edmund Wragge, manager of the line. The vacancy has been filled by appointing Mr. W. Whyte, manager of the Credit Valley Railway, to the position, so that that gentleman now holds the position of manager of the Credit Valley, Toronto, Grey, and Bruce, & Ontario and Quebec railways, all branches of the Canada Pacific line. Mr. Wragge has been appointed to a position on the Grand Trunk in order to meet a want long felt by merchants and business men in Toronto. Full powers have been given him to deal with and settle all questions in dispute without reference to Mr. Hickson at Montreal, thus entailing delay and inconvenience as has hitherto been the case.

Glenelg Council.

This council met at the Town Hall on 1st instant. All the members present.

Accounts passed—W. Whitmore, repairing scraper \$1.50; Thomas Cook, repairing plough \$2.00.

Davis, Mullarky.—That Richard Jack be paid, \$5.00 for repairing bridge at Lot 5 con. 8.—Carried.

A petition was received from R. E. English and others for a grant for the town-line of Holland and Glenelg.

Mullarky, Davis.—That \$15.00 be granted to repair the town line between Holland and Glenelg, from Glascott P. O. East, on condition that Holland grants an equivalent for the same place carried. Davis, Mullarky.—That \$12. be granted to cut a hill at lots 5&6, con. 4 S. D. R. carried. Dunsmore, McMillan.—That \$20.00 be granted to repair a hill at lot 28 con. 2 E. G. R. carried.

Council adjourned to meet at the same place on 10th December next.

The Toronto Grey and Bruce.

The directors met on Saturday, and it is believed that Mr. Sutherland Taylor was appointed general manager pro tem. It is said that the \$250,000 which the Ontario and Quebec were to give for the lease of the road has not yet been paid, though the amount is overdue.

The proprietor Mr. John McLeod, has a large stock of logs in his yard and will be able to supply the demand. The grist mill will commence about the 1st November. Forest, and who has been employed in American mills the past five years where grinding is done on the new system, they are now putting in purifiers, or rollers in their mill here and will no doubt be able to turn out a superior quality of flour.
