Meaford council has decided to
spend \$1,000 in dredging their har-
bour channel.

R. Little, butcher, Hanover, killed
and dressed a calf thirteen weeks old
that weighed 400 lbs.

Frederick Mann, the murderer of
the Cook family was hanged at L'Origi-
nal, on the 12th October.

The Mt. Forest Advocate favours the
numbering of houses in that town,
also the enlarging of their Town Hall.

Mr. Samuel Robinson has present-
ed the English church, Clarksburg,
with a handsome marble baptismal
font.

A by-law was carried last week in
Meaford, by fifteen majority, to pro-
vide means for purchasing a steam
fire engine.

The Shelburne Free Press is to be
run by a joint stock Company in fu-
ture. We shall now expect to see an
improvement in the paper.

Mr. E. Wragge, late manager of
the T. G. & B. Railway, entered upon
the duties of his new situation, on
Thursday last, viz: manager of the
Western division of the G. T. R.

DEPARTURE.—Rev. Mr. Turnbull is
about to take his departure from Shel-
burne to labour in another parish.
Before leaving he was presented with
a purse of money and an address.

Mr. Chas. McConnell is a successful
hunter. On Tuesday last he shot a
very large otter measuring three feet
six inches. The skin when stretched
measured four feet ten inches.—Dun-

DEAD.—Mr. D. J. Macdonald, a con-
tractor well known in these parts, and
for some time a resident of Colling-
wood, is dead. The deceased gentle-
man built most of the H. & N. W. R.
R., and helped to build the T. G. & B.,
and many railroads in Ontario.—Col-

A sad death, supposed to be the
effect of drink, occurred last week at
Hornings Mills. A man named Craw-
ford was found lying dead near the
sidewalk on the morning of the 1st, inst.
He has been drinking heavily
and as he is without relatives or friends
was buried as quickly as possible. It
is said that a sum of \$5 was due him,
and for this amount, some one under-
took to furnish a rough coffin and
perform the duties of sexton.

FIRE.—The barns of Mr. Morrison,
9th con. Derby, were totally consumed
by fire on Wednesday the 9th. Mr.
Morrison was threshing on that day
and the fire spread so rapidly that the
machine owned by Mr. Thomas Leslie
was also burned with the other con-
tents of the barn. The loss to Mor-
rison is heavy as he lost his whole
season's crop, and Mr. Leslie's loss
is also a serious one. The origin of
the fire is not exactly known, but is
supposed to be the result of careles-

Shows intended for breeding should
be separated from those intended for
the butcher, and fed a generous but
not fattening diet. Select those with
long bodies, straight backs, and having
the largest number of teats, as these
make the best breeders. When a
good breeder is thus secured, she
should have at least two or three litters,
and as many more as she will breed
without becoming unruly or getting
any bad habits.

Ninth meeting. Council met at Sing-
hampton on the 25th August.

Members all present. Minutes of last
meeting read and adopted.

COMMUNICATIONS.

Provincial Board of Health on the disposal
of sewage, &c. Co. Treasurer Tax Sale List
for 1883. Crown Lands department stating
that there are no Crown Lands in Osprey.
J. Johnston, and fifteen others re Town line,
Melancthon; Neil McKinnon, bill \$2.50,
mending scrapers; F. Whewell re bridge
Town line at lot 1 con. 11; Tp. Treasurer
Financial Statement; J. Hamilton, bills for
flour to indigents, viz:—Mrs. McQueen,
\$1.25; O. Miller, \$2.75; D. Buie, \$2.50; J.
Paul, bill coffin, \$5, for A. Grant; D. Mc-
Kinnon, certificate for performance of Sta-
tute Labour 64, 65, in 2 S., for 1882; Trus-
tees S. S. 2, 4, 3, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and Clerk of
Nottawasaga estimates for 3 moneys, Co.
Clerk, county rates.

MOTIONS.

The Clerk was instructed to ask the C. T.
to erase taxes for 1882 against 64 and 65 in
2 S.

The Com. of Division 3 was ordered to at-
tend to bridges 1 in eleven and 20 in 14 and
report both.

The Chairman of the R. and B. Committee
stated that the Com. had examined the bridge
at 18 in 2 S., and found it in a bad state of
repair, and recommended that a small piece
of land be bought for a deviation and do
away with the old bridge altogether.

The bridge at 6 in 4, and recommend that
the committee for the Div attend to it. The
bridge on 10 S. R. con. 2 S., and found it too
low, but do not recommend building a new
one, owing to the low state of the finances
and the lateness of the season.

This report was adopted.
Taylor, Speers—That the township be di-
vided in two for collection for 1883, and that
the gravel road be the boundary. Carried.

Johnston, McIntyre—In amendment, that
the township be redivided in two for col-
lection, but that one collector be appointed for
collecting the rates for 1883. Lost.

By-law 218 and 219 to appoint collectors
and levy rates were passed, and Wm. Suggat
was appointed collector for the south and J.
Elliott for the north.

Speers, McIntyre—That J. Johnston be
authorized to survey and establish a road on
lots 17 and 18, con. 3 S.

Orders were issued in favor of J. Copeman,
\$15, building culvert; J. Hamilton \$7.50,
flour to indigent; D. Buie, \$4, an indigent;
J. Pane, \$4, coffin, (A. Grant); W. McKinnon,
\$2.50, mending scrapers; J. Christie, \$2,
plank for road; John Taylor, \$22, work on
T. L. at 2 A; Council each, \$2, inspecting
inspecting roads and bridges.

Council adjourned to meet Oct. 15th.

Council met at the call of the Reeve in
Maxwell, Sept. 10.

Members present, Messrs. McGirr, McIntyre,
Johnston and Speers.
Minutes of last meeting read and adopted.

Johnston, Speers—That By-law 220 to
notify the report of the committee of the
County council forming a new school section
be introduced and read a first time. This
By-law passed through the several stages and
finally passed.

The new Section No. 3 is comprised of
the following lots, the first and last men-
tioned with all comprised in each case:—2
and 1 S and 1 N, lots 27, 44, 2 and 3 N; lots
21, 44, —, 5; lots 14, 24, —, 5; lots 17, 24,
7 and 7; lots 18, 25. Assessment including
personal property \$64,310, average of the 5
south sections \$67,150, difference \$2,840.

Bills paid, W. Hamlin, \$4; C. W. Rutledge,
\$5.50.

Council adjourned to meet at Feversham
on Oct. 15, next.
