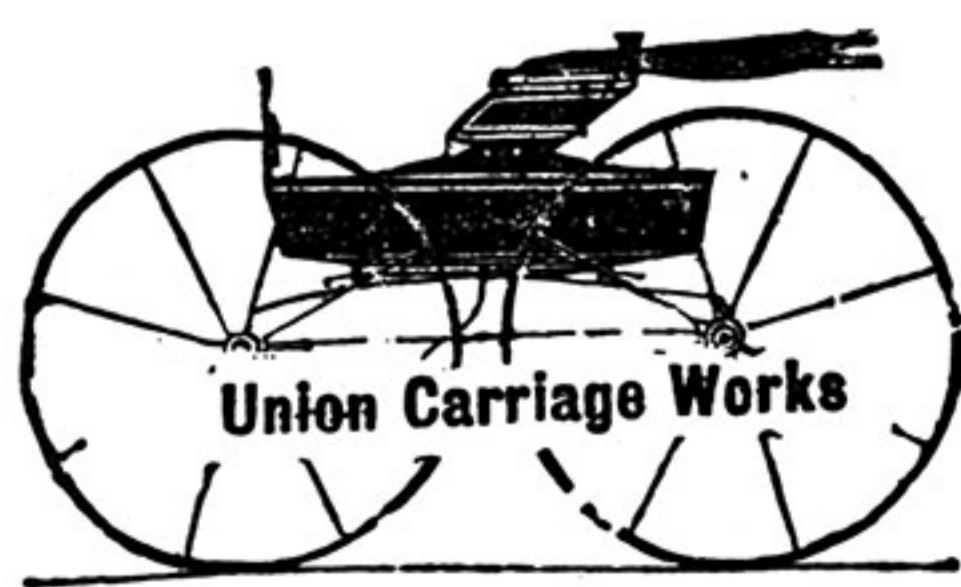

A Change of Time.

Until now there have been fifty-two differences of time in this county; under the new arrangements there will only be five differences, these being governed by five meridians.

The principle on which the new system is based will be easily understood if the reader remembers that the earth circling on its own axis brings in succession its three hundred and sixty degrees of circumference to the light of the sun every day. There being twenty-four hours in the day, fifteen degrees of the whole three hundred and sixty must thus pass a fixed point in the heavens every hour.

Therefore, a person travelling finds a difference of one hour for every fifteen degrees—nine hundred miles—travelled. The intermediate localities, one, two, or three degrees from his starting point, have had a proportionate difference in time.

Now, under the new system, each meridian of fifteen degrees will have a uniform time for all places within it, and the difference between one meridian and the other will be exactly one hour.

The change has been made, indeed, in the interest of simplicity, and it will prevent the confusion that has sometimes arisen from the great variation of time between cities as closely linked as Boston and New York.

District Dashes.

We are glad to learn the editor of the Orangeville Gazette has recovered from his late severe illness.

The Swan estate of Mr. Forest has been purchased by Mr. Jas. Honey, of that town.

Mr. Robert Walker, a pioneer of Osprey, died Nov. 22, at the age of 85 years.

The Postmaster General has increased the indemnity of the Dundalk post office from \$265 to \$400.

Mount Forest merchants have agreed to close their places of business during winter, at 7 o'clock p. m.

Messrs. Neilson of Proton station have commenced purchasing grain at Flesherton Station.

A full report of the seasons operations of the Dundalk cheese factory is given in the Herald of last week, and is said to be very satisfactory to the patrons.

Collingwood merchants will close their stores at 6 p. m. during the winter.

The people of Tara are anxious for a railway communication with Owen Sound, and the chances appear to be favorable.

A son of Mr. John Corbet, of Owen Sound, broke his leg while sleighriding last week in that town.

Owen Sound favours connection with Tara by rail, rather than Durham.

The Ontario and Quebec.

It is likely that this road will be ironed and bridged right through to Perth before February 1st and that on that date freight will be run over it to Ottawa. It is not probable that passengers traffic can be accommodated before July 1st by which time the ballasting ought to be completed. When that is done Toronto and Ottawa will not be more than seven hours apart with the tendency in the direction of still further reduction.—Toronto World.
