may not be out of place. from entering the car from either end, one cannot help feeling he has suddenly entered a conservatory arrayed in the most artistic manner, wreaths of corn, wheat, tobacco leaf and many grains and grasses, are woven and interwoven around roof and sides, in a thorough and artistic manner, bountets of all styles made from earth's fruits are scattered around most profusely, until one can scarcely believe he is not attending the exhibit of a French school of vegetable cookery, preparatory to the cooking process. One of the most notable ornaments in the car is a large bell hung in the centre of the car the lower part of which is made of wheat, corn rye, grasses, etc., and the upper part of corn and vegetables, for a clapper or hammer, a fine clapper-shaped squash is hung in the centre by a blue ribbon, under this bell a prize in money will be given to the loving couple who will join in the bonds of matrimony.

A FEW GOOD THINGS TO SEE. Corn in twelve varieties, including pop corn and the Dent corn, of which some very tine samples are shown, the Flint corn cobs, measuring sixteen inches in length. Radishes of the size of large rats and similarly haped, turnips, carrots and rutabaga in endless variety, the Little Queen, Mother Hubbard, Turban, Scollop and other varieties of squashes. The pumpkin display was very time, \$30 having been offered for one sample of sweet pumpkins. In the potatoe department the Early Ohio was the most prominent, not a single rotato weighed less than two pounds, some of them running to three pounds; there were the Snow Flake, White Elephant, White Star, Peach Blow, Barbank, Seedling, Western Red, and Victor. The display of grasses, Prairie red top, tive feet in height, Blue joint, seven feet in height, Slough grasses and other varieties are woven in all directions as well as standing in the sheaf. Sweet potatoes and tobacco grown at Yanktown, timothy, clover, onions of several varieties, including the Weathersfield, Yellow Denver, Silver Skin, and Early Red, some very fine c.trons, watermelens and crab apples. One long, clean looking cotton wood tree, about 20 feet long. attracts unusual attention; it was planted two years ago from a slip, and is now 31 inches in diameter, which clearly shows the speed with which a young plant will quietly mcrease in value. Some very fine samples

of timber grown from seed are displayed in

many varieties, including soft maple, box

elder, white ash, cotton wood, and apple,

samples of Okra, Martinua, hops, parsnips,

and cucumbers of two varieties. THE GRAIN DISPLAY is particularly fine, both in sheaves and botties, and many varieties are shown, particularly the Dakota, No. 1 hard, Mediterranean Spring, and other early wheat grown around ankton are very conspicuous. Both black and white oats are displayed, and among the latter are some exceedingly fine samples of White Russian, Flax seed, buckwheat, rye, barley, peas and berries can be found in another department, and also samples of fine, white flour from Chamberlain and ground at the mills of J. F. Sisson & Co. Sorghum or sugar cane and broom corn of great length decorate the roof of the car, and are interwoven with small sheafs of wheat cut at full length. On the bottom of the car are some very fine samples of Sioux Falls granice. The stone is compact and polishes to a high degree and is used in the erection of the finest structures at St. Paul and Minneapolis, Minn. The finest class of stone for art work in the collection is the conglomerated stone which once polished for table tops, mantlepieces, etc., would become the rage rapidly. The stone from which Indians make their pipes is also shown, and as a curiosity the autograph of the noted Sitting Bull, written in a plain sencel boy hand, also a handsome and carious walking cane cut on the Missouri river is one of the greatest of curiosities.

CLIMATE, STORMS AND RAINS. So much has been said in respect to the blizzards and heavy storms that are claimed for Dakota that a few statistics will not be amiss, and the reader should bear in mind that on account of the vastness of the territory a great difference will be found to exist between the region north of the 47th parallel, and that south of it. In southeastern Dakota the climate in many respects resimbles that of Indiana, Ohio, Iowa and southern Minnesota, with a greater number of suppy, and a less number of rainy days. The summers are agreeable, and little inconvenience is experienced from heat, owing to the prairie breezes which prevail during the warmer months. The fir is pure and dry in summer, clear and bracing in winter, a nose last long enough to pull.
