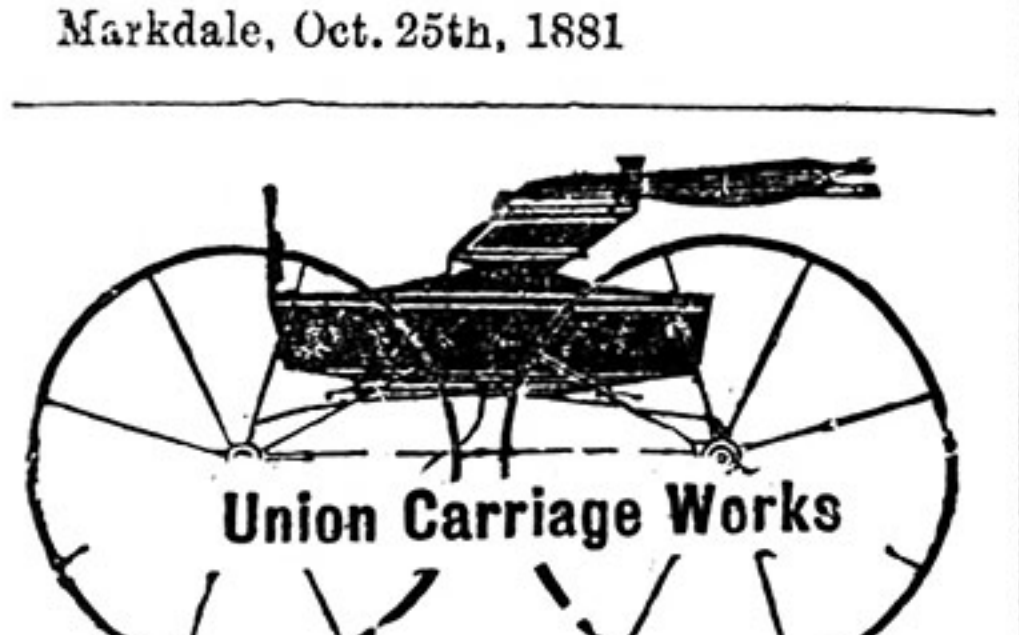

For the first time in the history of our village, considerable interest was manifested in the nominations for police trustees. No less than fifteen nominations were received by the returning officer.
