County Council.
 From the Times.
 THE Council of the County of Grey met at the Court House 2 p. m., on Tuesday last. Many of the members being delayed by Monday's snowstorm, the Council did not muster a quorum, and the Clerk adjourned the Council till evening.

TUESDAY EVENING.
 Council met at 7 p. m.
 The following gentlemen filed their certificates as having been duly elected Reeves and Deputy Reeves for their respective municipalities:—

The Council then proceeded to elect the Warden for the current year. Moved by Mr. D. McNicol, seconded by Mr. J. J. Middleton, That John Cameron, Reeve of Holland, be Warden for 1884.
 Moved by Mr. V. Lang, seconded by Mr. T. Gillray, That John Chisholm, Reeve of Owen Sound, be Warden for 1884.
 There being no other nominations, a ballot was taken with the following result—Cameron 26, Chisholm 14.
 The Clerk then declared Mr. John Cameron duly elected Warden for year 1884, who was introduced to the Council in his new position, by Mr. McNicol, Warden of 1883.
 Mr. Cameron thanked the Council for the honor conferred on him, though he felt his inability to fill the position, and took the honor as having been accorded to him because he was an old member of the Council. He would try to do what was just and right in conducting the affairs of the Council.
 Mr. Chisholm said he felt in duty bound to thank those who had supported him on the present occasion, and congratulated the Council on having so able a gentleman as Mr. Cameron to preside over them.
 Minutes of last day of December session were read and signed.
 Permission having been given, the President of the East Grey Agricultural Society addressed the Council, asking for a grant of from \$50 to \$100, to enable them to hold a Seed Show, where farmers might be able to get

good seed, and give them a chance to exchange seed grain. He referred to the importance of such a show, as large quantities of grain in the County had been frozen which was unsaleable, and some farmers who have to sell what they had reserved for seed.
 Dr. Christoe said if the South Grey and North Grey Agricultural Societies made a similar request in common with East Grey the matter would come before the Finance Committee.
 The Warden read a communication from the County Judge, complaining of want of proper accommodation for the Judge. The room "Judge's Chambers," had been used; but it was not properly lighted, and totally unfit for his requirements.
 On motion, a special committee to strike the standing committees for the year, was then balloted for, resulting in the appointment of Messrs. Christoe, McNicol, Hewgill, McRea, and Chisholm.
 The Council adjourned till 2 p. m. on Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.
 The Warden read communications from R. Edgar and J. Albery, asking to be appointed Auditors.
 Several other communications, and a number of accounts, were read, and referred to the respective committees.
 Dr. Christoe read report of the special committee to strike the standing committees for the year 1884, as follows:
 Finance and Assessment—Messrs. Christoe, McNicol, McKenny, Robertson, Caulfield, Gilray, McKee, Norton, Totten, Victor Lang, Gamey, Middleton, Bowes, Gordon, Dunnington, McNaught, Thompson, McKechnie, and Chisholm—McKechnie, chairman.
 Road and Bridge—Messrs. McIntyre, O'Farrell, Pedlar, McMillan, Paul, Clark, Fawcett, McCallum, Vasey, Rogers, and Messenger—Clark, chairman.
 County Property—Messrs. Christoe, Read, Miller, W. Lang, McNicol, Thompson, and Whitmenyer—Christoe, chairman.
 Education—Messrs. Gilray, Breen, Hewgill, Heming, Frost and Read—Hewgill, chairman.
 Printing—Messrs. McRea, Miller, Campbell, McCallum, Clark and V. Lang—Victor Lang, chairman.
 On Communications and Memorials—Chisholm, Middleton, McRea, McKechnie, McKenny, and V. Lang—Middleton, chairman.

On motion, the report was adopted.
 Moved by Mr. Middleton, seconded by Mr. McKechnie, That Thos. Gamey, and A. M. Stephens be appointed a Board of Audit—carried.
 Dr. Christoe read report from the School Inspector of South Grey.
 The Reeves of Glengela, Osprey, Sarawak and Deputy Reeves of St. Vincent and Keppel, were appointed a committee to inquire into the sufficiency of the Treasurer's security, and report to the Council.
 By-law 321, to appointed County Auditors, was read a first and second time.
 A motion by Mr. Middleton, seconded by Mr. Rogers, asking that a memorial be drafted and forwarded to the Lieut-Governor in Council, praying for certain amendments respecting property qualification of Police Trustees, and for changing times of holding nomination and elections for such, was lost.
 Council went into Committee of the Whole on By-law 321, to appoint County Auditors, which was filled up with the names of R. Edgar, on the nomination of the Warden, and J. Albery, on the part of the Council—salary \$50 each.
 Moved by J. J. Middleton, seconded by Thomas Gamey, That the County Solicitor be requested to furnish this Council with his opinion in writing as its next session on the following question: 1st—Were Robt. Myles and James Murdoch, Esqs., (members of the County Council at the time of the passing of the By-law No. 313,) eligible as County Valuers, and if not, would such be fatal to the defence of the case, should an appeal be taken from their report as Valuers of this Council? 2nd—The fact that the Valuers did not affix values to the

properties in the different municipalities at the time of inspection of the same, but subsequently at Owen Sound or else where—would this be a violation of the statute and an infraction of the By-law appointing them and defining their duties? 3rd—Should it be true that much of the inspection of the property in the County was made by only two of the persons appointed as Valuers—would this be fatal to the defence of the report in the event of adverse action being taken? 4th—Should it be a fact that the report after its adoption was discovered to contain numerous and grave errors in additions calculation—would the Committee on Finance and Assessment be obliged to use the said adopted report as their guide, not withstanding the presence of such errors?
 This motion brought on considerable discussion, the majority of the Council thinking it was out of place to again bring up the question of the legality of the appointment of the Valuers, after their work was completed, and further, that it reflected on the Valuers and their work.
 The motion was lost by 12 to 28.
 The Reeve of Durham introduced a By-law to appoint a High School Trustee, which was read a first and second time.
 Council adjourned till two o'clock on Thursday afternoon.

Glenelg Council.
 The newly elected council of the township of Glenelg met at the town hall on 21st instant, pursuant to statute. Each member made and subscribed the necessary declarations of qualification and office.
 Geo. Binnie and John McDonald were appointed auditors.
 Election expenses paid as follows:—Deputy returning officers each, \$4; door keeper each \$1.50; for each polling place \$4; Hugh McKay was paid \$1 extra.
 Orders were issued on the treasurer as follows:—
 A. Walker, work on the town line, Holland and Glenelg \$10; the Treasurer \$2 advanced by him for work on bridge near Griffin's Corners, and \$8 for cost of bank draft remitting County rates; J. S. Black, coal oil for town hall 20 cents.; Mr. Jenkins, election blanks \$1; Mr. Rutledge, printing, \$5.75; N. McIntyre, delivering ballot boxes \$12; Rowswell and Hutchinson election blanks \$4.75.
 Road Commissioners appointed:—Ward No. 1, J. A. McMillan; No. 2, A. McCuaig; No. 3, P. Neil; No. 4, N. Dunsmore.
 Lot 56, con. 2, E G R was exempted from taxes for 1883. Arrears of taxes against lot 18, con. 2, S D R struck off the roll.
 The statute labor against the roll and five days extra to be charged against said lot for the present year.
 Messrs. McMillan, McCuaig and Neil were appointed a committee to examine the Treasurer's sureties.
 The clerk tendered his resignation which was accepted and the following resolution passed.
 Resolved—That the thanks of this Council are due and are hereby tendered to James Brown Esq., for his valuable and faithful services to the municipality and in appreciation of said valuable services that he paid one hundred dollars over and above his usual salary, and this council does regret the step taken by Mr. Brown in resigning his position as clerk.
 John S. Black was appointed township clerk.
 Council adjourned to meet at the same place on 4th Feb. next.
