I am instructed by the County Council of this County to call your attention to the provisions of the Assessment act, R. S. O., Cap. 80, Section 23, which is as follows:—

"23. Except in the case of mineral lands hereinafter provided for, real and personal property shall be estimated at their ACTUAL CASH VALUE, as they would be appraised in payment of a just debt from a solvent debtor."

And to the penalty on Assessors for making improper Assessments, contained in sec. 191-2-3; and further, I am instructed to inform you that any Assessor willfully neglecting to assess in accordance with said section 23 subjects himself to be rigorously prosecuted according to law.

Euphrasia Council.

The members elect of the municipal council of the township of Euphrasia for the year 1884, being Thomas G. Gilray, Reeve; William Fawcett, Deputy Reeve; James Boyd, Wm. J. Black, and Henry Hard, Councillors.

Said members elect met in compliance with statute at the township hall, on Jan. 21st, 1884, and having made and subscribed their declarations of qualification and of office, filed the same with the clerk, and took their seats at the council board.

Minutes of last session of council read and confirmed.

W. H. Dodson, on nomination of the Reeve, and J. L. Wilson, on behalf of the council, were appointed auditors and a by-law passed accordingly.

A By-law was passed appointing A. T. Buchanan assessor at a salary of \$75.

The time for the collectors to return their rolls was extended.

The Treasurer was instructed to remit to the deputy returning officer, the amounts hereinafter placed opposite to their names as payment for services rendered at last municipal election, viz:

James Struthers, \$7.50; Nicholas Hewson \$7.10; Nathaniel Curry, \$7.10; W. H. Manary, \$6.70; James Yelland, \$7; Thomas Ambrochowie, \$7.

The Reeve and deputy reeve were appointed to enquire into the validity of the Treasurer's accounts, in compliance with statute.

James Falles was appointed caretaker of the township hall.

The Clerk was ordered to return to the County Treasurer arrears of taxes against the E. 1/2 of lot No. 7 in con. 5.

The Treasurer was ordered to pay the trustees of School Sections for the use of school houses used as polling stations at last municipal election, as follows:

Union School Section No. 4, \$2; S. S. No. 14, \$2; S. S. No. 15, \$2; S. S. No. 9, \$2, and to John Haliburt for the use of the Orange Hall, Kimberley, used also as a polling station, \$2.

The Reeve's orders were issued on the Treasurer as follows:

Robert Dunlop, clerk, services at last election, \$20; Thomas Cooledge charged in error for statute labor, \$9; Thomas Wickens, road work, \$1; Rodge Bower, road work \$3.

The council adjourned until the first Friday in February next.

Artemesia Council.

The newly elected Council of the Township of Artemesia, for the year 1884, met in the Town Hall, Flesherton, according to statute on that behalf on Monday, January 21st, 1884, and having made the necessary declaration of qualification and of office, they took their respective seats.

Members all present. Dr. Christie in the chair.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Council proceeded to elect a new Deputy Reeve.

Bleakley, Pedlar, that Samuel Pedlar be Deputy Reeve—Carried.

Accounts as follows were presented and read:

A. R. Fawcett, printing Ballots, &c., \$5.25; Hal Sullivan, fitting and cleaning Town Hall pipes, \$2.25; John Rutherford, election stationery and Collectors Rolls, \$8.41; W. J. Bellamy, quarter salary, \$27.50; do holding nomination and pollward \$, \$12.50 Payment ordered.

By Law No. 357, appointing C. C. James and Henry Meldrum Auditors, was introduced and passed in a usual way.

Blakely, Pedlar, that By-Law No. 357 be read a second time.—Carried.

Elliott, McArthur, that the Reeve issue order in favor of the Collectors for the sum of \$25 each, when they shall have their respective rolls returned according to law.—Carried.

McArthur, Elliott, that Robert McGowan be refunded the sum of \$24.60, being an overcharge of taxes on account of error in assessment for 1883.—Carried.

Pedlar, Bleakley, that Robert McGowan be refunded the sum of \$24.60, being an overcharge of taxes on account of error in assessment for 1883, but that the Council charge \$15.60 of this sum to School Section No. 12 Artemesia.—Lest.

Elliott, McArthur, that Mrs. Galbraith be refunded \$4.66, paid of arrears of taxes on Lot No. 132 1st West, she being in destitute circumstances.—Carried.

Christie, Bleakley, that Mrs. Morton, widow, be refunded \$3 on her taxes of 1883. Carried.

McArthur, Elliott, that Wm. Walters be refunded 76 cents being error in assessment. Carried.

Mr. McArthur moved, seconded by Mr. Bleakley, that Donald McDonald be refunded \$2, overcharge of statute labor on his non-resident lot in Riceville. Carried.

Mr. Elliott moved, seconded by Mr. McArthur, that the Clerk request the Co. Treasurer to erase all taxes in his books against lot 26, con. 2, W. D. R. the same having been paid to collector. Carried.

Mr. Pedlar moved, seconded by Mr. Bleakley, that the council for Ward No. 4, be and is hereby instructed to see to repairing and putting in a safe condition the bridge over the Beaver river at Eugenia.—Carried.

Mr. McArthur moved, seconded by Mr. Bleakley, that a motion passed by this council to-day to the effect that Robert McGowan be refunded \$24.60, be rescinded, the council having received information from the assessor that his assessment as the roll shows is correct.—Carried.

Mr. McArthur moved, seconded by Mr. Bleakley, that the Clerk advertise for applications for an Assessor for 1884.—Carried.

Pay for this day's session and indigents monthly allowance was ordered.
