NEWSPAPER LAW.

1. Any person who takes a newspaper regularly from the post office, whether directed to his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not—is responsible for the payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrearages, or the pub lisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount. whether the paper is taken out of the office or not.

3 I. ubscribers refuse or neglect to take periodic ils or newspapers from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled their bills.

4 The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the post office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is PRIMA FACIE evidence of intentional fraud.
