A serious riot broke out in Cincinnati on Friday night and was continued on Saturday, the result being a collision between the military and the mob, in which numbers of persons were killed and a vast amount of property destroyed. The trouble originated out of the failure of a jury to return a verdict of wilful murder against William Berner, who has been accused of killing Wm. H. Kirk. The verdict returned, which was one of manslaughter, caused intense excitement and a number of hot-headed citizens called a mass meeting to protest against it. Inflammatory speeches were delivered, and the audience were worked up to such a pitch of frenzy that they rushed from the place of meeting and attacked the gaol with the object of getting possession of Berner and hanging him. The movement was resisted and a fearful loss of human life followed.
