## NEWSPAPER LAW.

Any person who takes a newspaper regularly from the post office, whether directed to his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not—is responsible for the payment.  
If a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment made, and then collect the whole amount.  
If subscribers refuse or neglect to take their papers or newspapers from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled their bills.  
The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is PRIMA FACIE evidence of intentional fraud.

**Coal Oil Explosion.**  
FATAL RESULT OF AN ATTEMPT TO PUT OIL IN A BURNING LAMP.  
TIVERTON, April 5.—The eighteen-year old daughter of a farmer named Ross, of the sixth concession of Bruce township, attempted to fill a lamp with oil without extinguishing the light with terrible results. The oil in the can became ignited, and both can and lamp exploded, the shock of the explosion shaking the building, extinguishing every light, and leaving the inmates in total darkness. The other members of the family were unaware of what had happened, as the oil was kept in an upper room, and as a consequence the unfortunate girl was terribly burned before she was rendered any assistance. She only lived a short time after the accident.

The present system of superannuation of public officers ought to receive serious consideration from the people. As matters now go, the burdens laid on the taxpayers in this connection are serious, and they are growing heavier every year. This year it will require nearly a quarter of a million of dollars to meet the claims of the officers superannuated, and it is quite safe to predict that next year it will be still greater. The amount required has been regularly increased for years. As the law now stands, any officers may be superannuated at any time on a retiring allowance for the end of his days. It is a well known fact that a number of officers have been so retired during the past ten years who are yet strong and healthy, a number of whom did not wish to be superannuated at all. The system opens the way to remove officers who may possibly stand in the way of favorites being appointed. Of course every vacancy so created makes an opening for some friend, and openings are sometimes pressed for on that very account. Both parties have been doing very questionable things in this superannuation business, and so long as the system continues it may be expected that abuses will arise. Just why there should be any general system of that kind at all may be very well questioned. The public officers in Canada are fairly well paid and ought to be quite as able to lay by for the evil day of incapacity as other people. If they are not well enough paid to enable them to thus provide for themselves, by all means let an adequate amount be paid them. Other men engaged in business, quite as trying to themselves and quite as important to the country, do not expect any retiring allowance, and do not get it. By all means let the matter receive through attention speedily.
