DAIRING BURGLARY

McFarland's Store Entered and the Vault Blown Open.

OVER \$200 STOLEN.

No Clue to the Perpetrators.

On Sunday night last the establishment of W. J. McFarland, of this village, was entered and burglarized by supposed professionals, who blew up the lock of the door leading into the vault, and carefully secured what cash was within with the exception of \$150 in bills which was in a separate place. There being a heavy thunder storm during the night, nothing was heard or known of the affair until Monday morning, on entering when things were somewhat disorderly in the Post-office department, which leads to the vault. The lock was evidently blown open, as the smell of powder was still in those parts. Their entrance to the store appears a mystery, as all the doors were fast in their usual way in the morning. They escaped however through the window from the Post-office, leaving a sledge hammer, brace and bit, screwdriver, and other such tools. Nothing was molested in the store, they confining their operations to searching for and securing hard cash, which was not at that particular time in large quantities, being only some \$200 to be found. The night previous there was over \$700 in the same till. The funds belong to the Post-office, and we are not yet certain whether the Postmaster or the department will be responsible. There is no clue to the guilty parties, and to our knowledge, no suspicion as to who they may be. It is thought they also attempted a break on Trimble's store, but the dog, which keeps shop at night, made a racket, and is thought to have thus saved a further theft.

GLENELG ELECTION.

On Monday next, May 5th, the nomination for Reeve to fill the vacancy will be held at the town hall, Gleneleg.

There are various rumors as to who will be candidates for the position. Mr. Thos. Davis, who opposed F. MacRae, Esq., for Reeveship at the last election, will doubtless be to the fore. He has filed the office of Councilor as well as Deputy-Reeve in this township, and has proved himself worthy the confidence of the ratepayers, and should a man from this side of the township fail to take the field, the probabilities are that Mr. Davis will be the successful man.

Mr. Geo. Binnie is a young man of good judgment and fairly posted in municipal matters, and we are informed will be also a candidate.

We will be in a better position in another week to give a forecast.

Navigation Opening.

The City of Owen Sound will leave Collingwood to day for ports on Lake Superior and Port Arthur, and the Campana will leave tomorrow for Port Arthur direct. It is uncertain when the boats will be able to reach Port Arthur, as Thunder Bay is said to be still locked up with ice.—Tuesday's Mail.

Fire in Euphrasia.

OVER \$2,500 WORTH OF PROPERTY DESTROYED.

On Tuesday morning last about 2 o'clock a. m. the buildings of Mr. Hugh Abercrombie, of lot 11 con. 1 Euphrasia together with all his stock, comprising of 7 horses, 22 head of cattle, 20 sheep, about 500 bushels of grain, and all his agricultural implements was totally destroyed by fire. No clue as to how the fire originated has been obtained, but is supposed to be work of incendiary. Mr. Abercrombie's loss is estimated over \$2,500 as there was no insurance, save \$400 on the buildings, in Royal Insurance Company. The scene of the ruins the following morning is said to be terrible, some of the horses appear to have broken from the stall and got into the middle of fire, the sheep were huddled in one corner of their compartment and a valuable bull broke loose and got to the door where he fell in the flames. This has been one of the severest losses of any of our agriculturists in the County for years.

The Father of the Press.

THE OLDEST NEWSPAPER MAN IN CANADA DIES AT KINGSTON.

KINGSTON, April 28.—This morning Dr. E. G. Barker, city registrar, died at the advanced age of 85 years. He was generally considered the father of the Canadian press. In 1884 he founded the British Whig, and in 1889 began the publication of the Daily British Whig, the first daily in the Dominion. Some twelve years ago he retired from journalistic duties, the paper passing into the control of his grandson, E. J. B. Pense. Last New Year's eve the paper celebrated its 50th anniversary, and the 85th birthday of the veteran editor. The deceased was an energetic worker, a vigorous writer, and one of those early editors who did much towards laying the foundation of our Canadian constitution. His burial occurs tomorrow at two o'clock.

The Law of the Road.

TURN TO THE RIGHT.—The most important law of the road is, that when two persons in vehicles coming from opposite directions are about to meet, each shall reasonably bear to the right of the middle or travelled portion of the road, so that they can pass each other without interference. A traveller is not required to keep on the right side of the road all the time; he can drive where he pleases or where the going is best, so long as he turns to the right when he meets another vehicle. If the middle and usually travelled portion of the road is very muddy, and for this or any other reason persons are travelling along the side of the road, then the one who is on the left side of the road is in duty bound to turn out. Circumstances may arise which would justify a deviation from it, and when they do arise, a traveller cannot stick blindly to the law, and then claim damages if he is injured. In the crowded streets of a metropolis drivers are required to exercise very great care, and when the high degree of care dictates a departure from this law of the road, then it is not only justifiable, but a failure to observe it might cut off one's right to recover damages if he is injured. This turning to the right is just the opposite of that in England, which requires all drivers to turn to the left. The rule of turning in England is based on long honored custom; our rule is established by statute. FOOT PASSENGERS.—All persons have the same right to walk in the highway that they have to drive there, and they have the same right to walk in the middle of the street that they have to walk on the foot-path at the side. When one is walking in the wagon track, he must observe greater care to avoid collision with vehicles, but the fact of his being there is not of itself negligence. It is his duty to turn out for teams, especially if heavily laden, but teamsters have no right to run over him simply because he happened to be in the way. They would be liable for the injury if they did. Foot passengers have the undoubted right to cross the street at any time and place, and persons driving along it must use due care not to run into them, and must hold up to let them get by. The foot passenger must also exercise due care to avoid injury, for if he does not, he can recover no damages if injured. If he sees a team coming at a rapid rate he is not justified in attempting to cross ahead of it, or should he attempt crossing a crowded thoroughfare without first looking carefully both ways. H. A.
