THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY IN MARKDALE.

The morning of the 24th opened exceedingly gloomy and continued very discouraging until the afternoon with showers about 12 o'clock, so that the committee of management almost decided, at half-past twelve, to adjourn the sports; however the people commenced to crowd around the gate for admission to the grounds, while quite a number could be seen climbing over the high board fence. The weather also began to improve, and it was thought advisable to go on with the sports, so the gate was opened, and before many hours had elapsed, over one thousand spectators were on the grounds. The program was at once entered on and mostly gone through with, to the entire satisfaction of all concerned. A FELT WANT.
If there is one thing wanted in Markdale more than another at the present time, it is we believe, a town hall. The village is actually without a place fit for a public entertainment. Shelburne built an \$8000 town hall which brings a rental of 12 per cent. per annum on the capital invested.

Chatsworth is about erecting one at a cost of \$875, and they only ask assistance from the village by way of tax to the amount of \$150. We trust our citizens will give the matter their earnest consideration.

Holland council met here Wednesday as a court of revision. An extensive day's business was done.

Mr. H. Foster has purchased the west corner lot, upon which he will erect a large store next season.

Mr. C. Price is preparing the foundation for a store, the one now occupied being too small for his increasing business.

Mr. W. H. Walker has a good stock of tinware and stoves and appears to be doing well.

Flesherton.

The Temperance convention, held in the Town Hall here last Thursday, was well attended. A good representation of active Temperance workers throughout the township were present. The meeting was unanimously in favor of submitting the Scott Act in this county.

The 24th of May passed off quietly throughout the day in this village, business places closed, and almost everybody away, either fishing, hunting, pic-nicing, driving until evening, when groups might be seen wending their way to the Town Hall to enjoy the social gathering or basket social held in that place, under the auspices of the Ladies Aid Society of the Presbyterian church here. A most enjoyable evening was spent. Proceeds \$20.

The handsome illuminated clock which graces the tower of Mr. M. Richardson's new block, and which was illuminated and set running for the first time on the evening of the 24th is a valuable ornament to the village.

Artemesia Council.

This council met in the town hall, Flesherton, on Monday, May 5th, 1884. Members all present: the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Communications as follows, presented and read:—Deputy Reeve, Glenelg, re bridge on town line; Fred Gee re statute labor; John McAuley re opening Kincardine street, Priceville.

By-laws Nos. 360, appointing local board of health for 1884; 361 amending; 359 appointing municipal officers, were introduced and read the requisite number of times and passed.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that the auditors' report as presented and finally audited by committee, be adopted and two hundred copies printed, and that the public health by-law be printed as an appendix to the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that it has been shown to this council that many persons in the township have built fences across roads and streets in their vicinity, contrary to the by-law in that behalf, made and provided (being by-law No. 277), and notwithstanding that the attention of pathmasters has been called to the fact they have failed to give the proper notice to parties offending and arraign them before a justice of the peace. This council now peremptorily demand that every pathmaster must perform his duty in such cases, else be subject to the penalty which may be imposed in the manner provided by said by-law, and

that this resolution be printed on the road lists.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that \$600 be appropriated for repairs to roads for 1884, viz., \$150 in each ward.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Pedlar, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that Mr. McArthur act conjointly with the Deputy Reeve of Glenelg in repairing bridge on the town line near Priceville.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that this council purchase from Moffat Bros, Markdale, 12 scrapers for the use of the township, viz., three for each ward, at \$10 each, to be delivered where required.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Pedlar, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that the Reeve issue his order in favor of S. S. No. 13, for \$29.90, balance of Trustees rate for 1883.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Elliott, that B. Ghent be refunded \$2, being refund for statute labor performed, but returned in 1882.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Pedlar, seconded by Mr. Blakley, that David Wright be refunded \$6.50 for statute labor performed, but returned against his lots in Euphrasia, 1883.—Carried.

The council adjourned to meet as a Court of Revision on the assessment of 1884, on Monday, June 2nd, 1884.
