DEATH OF MR. JOHN MAN-ABEY.

It becomes our painful duty this week to chronicle the death, under sad circumstances, of Mr. John Man-arey, of the 9th con., Euphrasia. He was a strong, healthy, active man of 29 years when about three weeks previous to his death his mind suddenly became deranged in such a form as to render it necessary to put him under guard, and he was placed in Owen Sound jail, where he died two weeks later.

A coroner's inquest was held on the body when a verdict of death, caused by "physical exhaustion produced by acute mania," was returned. He died on the 80th ult. and his body removed home.

THE FUNERAL.

took place from his late residence on Sunday last to the Presbyterian cemetery, 9th con., Euphrasia, and was very largely attended. Rev. Mr. McLaren preached an impressive sermon and the funeral was conducted by the Orange body, of which he was a member. The Orange Young Britains of Meaford attended as a body, while every Orange Lodge in the district was represented.

The deceased leaves a wife and four children to mourn his premature demise, together with a large circle of friends. The sad event has cast a gloom over the whole community.

DISTRICT MEETING.

The Owen Sound District Meeting of the Methodist Church, met in Owen Sound, on Wednesday, 28th inst.; the Rev. D. C. McDowell in the chair. There was a full attendance of ministers and delegates. A large increase both in finances and membership was reported, and the district generally was found to be in a prosperous condition. The provisional district meeting was held on the following day. Rev. Mr. Edmunds, B. D., was elected secretary.

Two new missions were arranged for two married ministers, and two probationers were requested for Dundalk and Walter's Falls, if they can be obtained.

Rev. J. E. Howell, M. A., was elected to the Sabbath School committee; J. W. Armstrong, Esq., to the Missionary committee, and Rev. Wesley Casson to the Stationing committee of the Guelph Conference.

The following gentlemen in this immediate neighborhood were elected as lay delegates to the Conference: Alfred Frost, J. W. Armstrong, H. D. Irwin, T. Hall, W. Cartwright and Robert Walker.

An interesting Sabbath School convention was held in connection with the meeting. Mr. W. A. Brown as delegate represented the Methodist schools on the Markdale circuit.

Mr. A. T. Buchanan left on Tuesday for Regina. N. W. T. He erected, recently, a very neat and comfortable residence in Kimberly where his family remain for the present time.

The people of this village have completed arrangements whereby the Post Office will shortly be removed to the village, Mr. Hammon, our store keeper, will likely be postmaster.

This will be a great convenience to all who get their mail matter at this office, as the office heretofore was about 1/4 of a mile from the village.

The crops are now making rapid advancement. Fall wheat is below an average and spring wheat is poor on heavy soils while it is very good on light land, other grain is looking well while hay and fruit prospects are excellent.

We were told there was a fall of snow on the mountain last Friday morning. We don't like snow in summer time in Owen Sound.

We had a very pleasant drive on Friday last to Rocklyn.

The council met that day at a Court of Revision in the town hall. There were numerous appeals, but the assessment roll did not suffer any very material change.

Mr. W. H. Dodson has erected a new hotel and stables since we visited the capital last. He keeps a good table, an attentive hostler, and appears to do a good business. We do not taste liquor, so leave that for others to judge.

Our respected friends, Reynolds Bros., are doing a fine business in general store keeping.

Mr. Wm. Martin, one of the pioneers of Euphrasia, died on Friday last, aged 84 years. He was buried by the Orange body.

Fire in Priceville.

Shortly after one o'clock Sunday morning last fire was discovered in Watson's carriage and paint shop. Geo. Ferguson, whose parents live on the hill opposite the village, was the first to give the alarm, having seen the fire from his room. In a short time the majority of the citizens were on hand, but too late to save the building, which was speedily consumed, together with the blacksmith shop and warehouse adjoining which also belonged to Mr. Watson. Scarcely any thing was saved except the contents of the ware-house, such as the hearse, coffins, etc. Had it not been for the well aimed exertions of those present in saving Mr. Johnson's dwelling on the West, together with the fact of the wind shifting westward at the time, the post office, telegraph office and Crown hotel would certainly have been laid low by the devouring element, in fact that side of the street could scarcely have escaped throughout westward. Messrs. Watson's loss will amount to \$2,000, partially insured in the Gore district their loss will be about \$1,000 over the insurance. The origin of the fire is a mystery as the workmen are not smokers, and there has been no fire in the building for some time.

Moved by Mr. Howey, seconded by Mr. Galbraith, that a by law be prepared to repeal by law No. 6, 1883, and to pass at the next meeting of council.

Moved by Mr. Howey, seconded by Mr. Galbraith, that by law No. 8, for the purpose of appointing patrollers, constables and fence-viewers be read and second and that same be approved by the council.

Moved by Mr. Howey, seconded by Mr. Galbraith, that the following be appointed as patrollers, constables and fence-viewers:—

Henry Roberts and Thomas Monr were appointed as patrollers, constables and fence-viewers. The council also appointed a committee to prepare a by-law to repeal by law No. 6, 1883, and to pass at the next meeting of council. Council meets again on the 9th of June.
