Just before they leave Britain the swallows assemble in vast numbers every evening; they are very noisy, and seems to be consulting as to their future proceedings. The course which they follow from the is land has been ascertained with tolerable accuracy. They cross the Channel to the French coasts; then they proceed southward through Spain until they come to the Straits of Gibraltar, and so cross the narrow sea into Algeria. Those which come from the northern part of the Continent seem to arrange themselves into three divisions. One takes the same track as the Eoglish birds. The second chooses a central route, enters Italy and crosses to Corsica by means of in May. Elba, Monte Christo, and other small Islands that can serve as resting places. From Corsica they pass through Sardinia, and reach Africa by way of Tunis. The third division traverses the whole of Italy, passes into Sicily, and thence crosses to North Central Africa. It is stated that a gentleman residing at Prague caught a swallow before migration, and fastened a small white ribbon with the werd "Bohemia" written upon it. In the following spring the bird came back bearing another ribbon with "Hlspania" upon it. It is stated that a gentleman who lived at St. Omer captured on April 26, a swallow which had a label attached to its leg. on which was written "Tunis, April 25, 1882:" Now, the distance in a straight line from Tunis to St. Omer is about 1100 miles, and the question was naturally raised as to the capability of the bird to travel so great a distance in twenty-four hours. In answer to this question it was, from Bordeaux to Paris-about three hundred miles-in seven hours, and therefore it would be possible for the swallow to traverse 1100 miles in twenty-four hours.

The History of Coke. The history of the discovery of coke and the development of the traffic has never been written. Authentic information of the first use of oke in this country places it in Meason, one of the earliest founders of Western Pennsylvania, in refining iron at the Plumsock, or Upper Middleton mill, a few miles from the Youghjogheny river. In America. 1818 the use of coke was attempted by blast furnaces, but it had to be abandoned because the blast was too light, being only five pounds to the square inch. Even when the value of coke as a furnace fuel was fully appreciated, the enjoyment of its advantages was prevented by inability to increase the blast. In 1835 William Firmstone manufactured good gray-forge iron at the Mary Ann furnace, in Huntingt n county, with coke produced from Broad Top coal. It the same year F. H. Ouphant, of Fairchance furnace, near Uniontown, exhibited at the Franklin Institute, Philadelphia, samples o iron made from blue jumy ore melted with coke. In 1840 the Great western Iron Works, at Brady's Bend, built four coke furnaces. 


