The Council met as a Court of Revision, on the 19th June 1884.

Members all present except the Deputy Reeve.

The following action was taken by the Court concerning the assessment for the current year, viz., John McConnel, reduced \$100; N^o 2, con. 2, non res. land, reduced \$900; William Allan, reduced \$100; William Douglas reduced, \$100; Thomas McConnel, reduced \$200; John McInnis assessed for N^o 21, con. 11, Angus McInnis assessed for S^o 21, con. 11, Angus McInnis Jr., placed on the roll as farmer's son, Rufus Wickens, reduced \$100; John Dales, reduced \$100; Joseph Wilson and James Wilson assessed jointly for S. W. 1/4 of lot 21, concession No. 1, and George Wilson placed on the roll as owner, James Quinten, reduced \$100.

The roll was then confirmed as finally revised.

The Court arose.

Council resumed. Minutes of last session of Council read and confirmed, Samuel Wright was appointed pathmaster instead of William Overland, resigned.

Mr. Hurd was appointed to expend a small amount on building a culvert on 9d line at lot 13. The Reeve was appointed to employ men to make repairs on 7th line at lots 12 and 15.

The Reeve was appointed to expend \$25 on side line 18 and 19, in 9d and 4th concessions. Money order was issued in favor of W. J. Boyd, for \$36.50, payment for work on 9th line.

Council adjourned until the first Friday in July next.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That By-law No. 5 for the purpose of repairing: By-law No. 8 of 1883, U. S. S. No. 11 and 3, be signed, sealed and engrossed on the Minutes.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Howey, That the Clerk prepare a By-law to annex the Holland portions of U. S. S. No. 2 H. & S. to sections No. 9 & 6, the clerk to notify all parties interested.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That Thos. Clark be appointed an arbitrator to equalize U. S. No. 1 & 3, H. & E., and the Clerk notify Euphrasia Council.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That the Clerk write to Pratt & Co. to refund the money sent them by the Clerk for Keehoe Manna.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That Jas. Dudgeon be instructed to let Thos. Burnett perform three days' stable labour on 9th line at lot of his mill.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Howey, That John Weller be

his lot at Blind line, to be surveyed on street and three rods on Blind line for a public road.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Howey, That the Council spend \$706 on the Township Road this year, to be apportioned as follows:—West 136, South 185, north 165, east 136, East.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That this Council spend on the roads this year \$695, apportioned as follows:—N. 150, S. 150, E. 130, W. 130, C. 130.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That Dr. Kennedy be pathmaster in place of F. Evers.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Howey, That Willard & Steadman be put in a road beat by themselves (Willard to be pathmaster.)

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Howey, That the Council act as road inspectors for this year.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That this Council grant \$10 towards buying necessaries of life for Mrs. Sinclair.

A petition was presented to the Council for aid to assist in paying the doctor's bill of Mrs. Sinclair.

Moved by Mr. Norton, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That the prayer of the above petition be granted by giving an order on the Treasurer for \$10.

Moved and seconded that the Council adjourn till the 10th of July.
