**Euphrasia Council.**  
The council met pursuant to adjournment on the 1st August, 1884. Members all present. Minutes of last session of council read and confirmed. The Reeve, Deputy-Reeve and Mr. Boyd, were appointed a committee to ascertain the assets and liabilities of the township, with a view to the levying of the rates for the current year. The committee reported that 7 mills in the dollar will be sufficient to meet all the liabilities of the township for the current year, except 8 Trustees rates. The report of committee was adopted, and by-law No. 389, to levy the rates for the current year, was carried through the different stages and passed.  
Mr. Boyd and Mr. Black were appointed to examine side road 27 and 28, con. 8, with a view of improving it.  
The Reeve was authorized to call upon Mr. Sing, D. & P.L.S., to locate a deviation of 12 to 18 side road, con. 2, and to get the road made passable at this place.  
The petition of James Morwood and 16 others, in reference to crossing on 9 and 10 side road, con. 8, laid before council and accepted, and Mr. Boyd and Mr. Black appointed to take action therein.  
Mr. Black and Mr. Hurd were appointed to get repairs made at lots 7 and 8, on 5th line.  
The Treasurer was ordered to pay the Reeve \$39.25, being amount of witness fees, in case of the appeal of Quarry, Proton and Dentine, against the County Valuation.  
The Reeve's orders were issued on the 27th inst.

### A Cure for Diphtheria.

We hope some of our physician readers will try the following treatment. The New York Sun states that Ruth Lockwood, a nine-year old child, became violently ill with diphtheria a few weeks ago. She was so weak that it was deemed dangerous to try tracheotomy, or cutting open the windpipe. On Thursday Dr. Nichols, who was attending her, received a copy of the Paris Figaro, which contained a report made to the French Academy of Medicine by Dr. Delthil. Dr. Delthil said that the vapors of liquid tar and turpentine would dissolve the fibrinous exudations which choke up the throat in croup and diphtheria. Dr. Delthil's process was described. He pours equal parts of turpentine and liquid tar into a tin pan or cup and sets fire to the mixture. A dense resinous smoke arises, which obscures the air of the room. "The patient," Dr. Delthil says "immediately seems to experience relief; the choking and rattle stop; the patient falls into a slumber and seems to inhale the smoke with pleasure. The fibrinous membrane soon becomes detached, and the patient coughs up microbioides. These, when caught in a glass, may be seen to dissolve in the smoke. In the course of three days the patient entirely recovers." Dr. Nichols tried this treatment with little Ruth Lockwood. She was lying gasping for breath when he visited her. First pouring about two table-spoonsful of liquefied tar on an iron pan, he poured as much turpentine over it and set it on fire. The rich, resinous smoke which rose to the ceiling was by no means unpleasant. As it filled the room, the child's breathing became natural, and she gradually got down the full sleep.
