"PETER THE GREAT" INFLECTS DREADFUL INJURIES UPON A TORMENTOR.

"Drunken men and fools are always safe" is an old adage, which, however true as a rule, has some exceptions. One of these exceptional cases, if they are exceptional, happened on Saturday last at the Zoo. A man named Sam Thompson, who is employed as engineer on the *Maxxpa*, managed to gain admission to the Gardens, after being refused twice at the door because of his being intoxicated, and was found in the cage with the cavelts teasing them. From thence he was very summarily ejected and thrown out of the grounds, but managed again to get in, and returned to the same place, but was again put out on the street, as it was thought finally. A short time afterwards one of the keepers was horrified to see him standing inside the guard rail of the cage occupied by the large bear "Peter the Great," and with his hand in the bear's mouth. Peter, as the board in front of his cage tells everyone, is dangerous, and no sooner had the man's hand in his throat than he commenced to crunch it, and when finally the bear was forced to let go the hand and arm were found to be so badly mangled that it had to be amputated at the General Hospital. The managers of the Zoo have taken every possible precaution to prevent accidents of this kind, and have placed an extra stout railing in front of all the cages occupied by dangerous animals, but they seem of no use in keeping drunken men away.

Canada's Great Fair.

NOTES ON THE EXHIBITIONS AND THE DIFFERENT ATTRACTIONS:

Bicycle races will form one of the features of the program during the second week.
A large number of entries and photographs for the exhibit of types of beauty have been received.
Cheap rates have been arranged with all the railways, and a great number of visitors is expected.
The grounds have been closed to the public and no person is admitted except those having business.
Applications are being received from all parts of Canada and the United States, and several hundred have already been accepted.

A large glass case nearly sixty feet long has been erected for the display of ladies work of a valuable kind.
Over one hundred electric lights and an electric tower 150 feet high, will be used to illuminate the grounds and buildings each evening.
The art gallery has been fitted out as a concert room, and organ and piano recitals, and vocal and instrumental music will be given each day and evening.
Those who have not made their entries should do so at once, as it is possible, on account of the large number already in, that those coming in late may have to be refused for want of space.
The engines and shafting in the machinery hall have received a thorough overhauling and cleaning. Steam was got up yesterday and the engines tested. The boilers will be tested next week.
The Committee on horses visited the grounds yesterday afternoon and decided to erect additional stalls, but those exhibitors whose entries are in before Monday will have the preference in getting stalls.
It has been decided by the gas company to erect an elevator from the ground floor to the top gallery of the main building which will be a great convenience to exhibitors as well as the public in general.
The electric railway is rapidly approaching completion. Mr. Vandepoole, of Chicago, is here, and is giving it his personal superintendance. Three cars arrived from London yesterday, and were placed on the track.
Toronto's great Industrial Fair, which will be held from Sept. 10th to 20th, promises to excel that of any previous years. The entries are pouring in and the energetic secretary, Mr. Hill, and his assistant are kept busy almost night and day.
Mr. Robertson, of the "Little World" exhibit, arrived here yesterday with the exhibit, from San Francisco. As soon as the building is completed he will at once commence its erection, which will take considerable time.

On Saturday morning last, Dr. Dowsley was called in to see a notorious woman named Mrs. Robinson, who resides on a hill near the Catholic Church, and found her dead. As there were marks of violence on the body, he informed the County Attorney, and an inquest was held before Coroner Cameron. Drs. Dowsley and C. E. Barnhart having made a post mortem examination, testified that there were several marks of ill-usage on the body, which might have been there for some time, but that she came to her death from a blow on the temple with some blunt instrument, which had not been inflicted many hours. The other inmates of the house, besides the deceased, were her daughter Mrs. Maggie Campbell and a man named Wm. Scoones who lived with her. All except the children were called to give evidence, and it was quite apparent that all the women and Scoones had been drinking on the Friday.
