Glenelg Council.

Town Hall, Glenelg, Sept. 29th, '84.
The council met this day, pursuant to adjournment. All the member present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Moved by Mr. McCuaig, Seconded by Mr. McMillan, That Alex. McPhail be paid the sum of \$18.25 being half cost of job, on Townline of Egremont and Glenelg, and Mr. John Morrison \$6.00 for job on con. 4, sideroad 40, and \$6.00 for job on sideroad 20, con. 5, and Martin Stonehouse \$30.00 for job on old D. R. at Lot 26, John Morrison's and Martin Stonehouse's to be left in the Treasurer's hands till they complete their jobs.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded by Mr. McCuaig, That John Cameron be paid \$1.00 for removing fallen timber off sideroad at Lot 10, con. 1st, N. D. R.—Carried.

By-law 226, appointing collectors, and By-law 227, appointing Polling places and deputy Returning officers, was introduced a first and second time.

Moved by Mr. Neil, Seconded by Mr. Dunsmore, That Hugh McLeod be paid \$25.00 for crosswaying at Lot 14, con. 12.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dunsmore, Seconded by Mr. Neil, That N. G. Dunsmore, Jr., be paid \$1.00 for repairing covering of bridge over Saugeen River at Lot 16, con. 1. E. G. R.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded by Mr. McCuaig, That M. Beaton be paid \$8.00 for work opposite lot 11, con. 2. N. D. R., and Charles Grey be paid \$7.60, being half cost of repairing bridge on Garafraza Road at lot 29 Glenelg & Bentinck.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded by Mr. Dunsmore, That Mr. Neil be paid \$2.00 as commission on \$25.00 expended by him.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded by Mr. Dunsmore, That by-law No. 226, be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on the minutes.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded by Mr. McCuaig, That C. W. Rutledge be paid \$3.65 for Printing 900 tax collector's Receipts.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Neil, Seconded by Mr. McCuaig, That the Clerk notify James Nichol of Egremont, that unless he at once pays to the Treasurer the sum of \$2.00 that was expended in removing his dead horse from off the road he will be proceeded against as the law directs.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded by Mr. Neil, That the commissioner for ward No. 3 be instructed to give Donald O'Hanly a job on the roads on the 8th con. to the amount of his Taxes for 1884, as his barn and contents were burned, and that the collector for that ward be notified to that effect.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McCuaig, Seconded by Mr. McMillan, That by-law No. 227, be read a third time, signed, sealed, and engrossed on the minutes.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dunsmore, Seconded by Mr. Neil, That Thos. Davis, J. A. McMillan and Arch. McCuaig be a committee with power to let by contract the building of a bridge over Saugeen river at lot 56, con. 3, E. G. R., binding the contractors to get out all the timber during winter, and to have the job completed on or before the first day of July 1885, and also to keep the present structure in a passable state until such time as it is necessary to remove the same to commence building the new bridge.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dunsmore, Seconded by Mr. Neil, That the Clerk's account for Postage and Stationery and quarter's salary amounting to \$40.00 be paid.—Carried.

Council adjourned to meet at Town Hall on the 15th December 1884.

A project which has been talked about for a good many years among some of the leading Presbyterians of Canada, seems likely at length to crystallize into something like definite shape. It is proposed to form a joint-stock company and start a newspaper which shall be much more truly representative of wealth and intelligence of that powerful church, than the journal which at present figures as its organ. Much dissatisfaction, it is said, is felt with the Canadian Presbyterian. No enthusiasm is felt for it in any part of the denomination. Many of the ministers feel very coldly towards it, and express themselves unable conscientiously to urge their people to take it on the whole these seem good reasons to believe that a new paper, once started, and edited with the ability the Presbyterian Church ought to be well able to supply, would have no reason to complain of lack of support. Such a body as the Presbyterians which includes such a large proportion of the wealth and intelligence of the Province, ought to support a denominational paper second to none on this continent.
