## Fall Assizes.

The Fall Assizes for this County opened on Tuesday, the 4th inst., Hon. Justice Armour presiding. The criminal calendar is an unusually heavy one, including one murder case, one of manslaughter, two of robbery, one of larceny, one of false pretences. There are also twenty-two civil cases on the list. Mr. A. Frost conducted the criminal business on behalf of the crown.

The following cases were disposed of:—

NEILSON vs. PARKINSON.—A case of ejectment from premises in Manitowaning. Judgment reserved. James Mason for plaintiff; Mr. Walker of Hamilton for defendant.

BAXTER vs. SUTHERLAND, et al.—The plaintiff was agent to purchase ties on Manitoulin Island for defendants James Sutherland and Joseph Manghan, and this action was brought to recover a balance of salary alleged to be due, but which defendants disputed. Judgment reserved. Jas. Mason for plaintiff; Jno. Creasor, Q. C., for defendant. Sutherland, J. M. Kibbourn for defendant Manghan.

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill against Wm Scones for murder.

GIBBONS vs. ROOLEY.—This action exposed the queer doings of a J. P. on the Manitoulin Island. It appeared that a Mr. Miller owned a wharf at Little Current, and arranged with a farmer named Rooley to bring him some timber to repair it. When the timber was delivered, he condemned a couple of the sticks, but they lay for some months with the others. In the meantime Miller became insolvent, and the assignee sold the dock to Mr. Gibbons, a merchant there, undertaking to repair it before giving possession. He took the timber that was there, and repaired the dock, Mr. Gibbons being away from home and having nothing to do with it. About a month after, Rooley (apparently encouraged with the local magistrate) had Gibbons arrested on a charge of stealing his timber, and brought before Sims, J. P., who adjourned the case and put him in the lock-up for five days, without a shadow of testimony that Gibbons had been guilty of anything. At the final hearing he had to be discharged, as there was absolutely nothing against him. He now brought this action against Rooley for malicious arrest. The jury brought in a verdict of \$1200 damages. Creasor & Platt for plaintiff; Jas. Mason for defendant.

WEDNESDAY.

QUEEN vs. COOK TEETS.—The trial of Cook Teets, the blind man of Artemesia, on a charge of poisoning his wife last fall, was commenced on Wednesday morning, and had not been concluded as we went to press. Mr. A. Frost was for the prosecution, and Mr. J. Mason defended the prisoner. We will give a report of trial next week.

THE GREAT HORSE BREEDING ESTABLISHMENT OF AMERICA.—One of the many wonderful enterprises the great West is noted for and one which none favored with opportunity should miss, is the great breeding establishment of "Oaklawn," owned by M. W. Dunham, at Wayne, Ill., 85 miles from Chicago. His importations of Percheron horses from France to date, have aggregated the immense sum of \$3,000,000, and at the present time at "Oaklawn," 300 head of the choicest specimens of that fine, nearly all recorded with their pedigrees in the American Stud Book of France, can be seen while on their Colorado range are 5,000 mares and 27 imported Percheron stallions in breeding.

## C. P. R. Exhibition.

According to notice in the STANDARD, as well as by posters, a car containing samples of produce from the C. P. R. experimental farms, and other portions of the North West, was at Markdale station on Wednesday in order to give the citizens of our village and surrounding district an opportunity of seeing, without any expense, a sample of the products and soil of the Canadian North West.

The car has been fitted up for the purpose, and is well filled, and tastefully arranged with various samples of wheat, oats, barley, peas, timothy seed, flax, corn, turnips, potatoes, mangle wurtzel, beets, citrons, celery, 94 lb squash, cabbage, kohlrabi, tomatoes, onions, wild hops, wild vetches, &c., &c. The sections are chiefly taken from the C. P. R. experimental farms; there are ten of those farms located along the line of the C. P. R. about forty miles apart the nearest one to Winnipeg being 448 miles west while the farthest one is 785 miles distant. The grain is shown both in the sheaf and in the bag, and is a very creditable exhibit, while the roots and vegetables (especially the latter) were indeed remarkable for size and quality, twenty one varieties of potatoes from one farm, grown by S. J. Jackson, M. P. P. for Stonewall, was in itself a creditable exhibit in that line. Flax is now extensively and successively cultivated from which oil cake and linseed oil is manufactured in Winnipeg. The exhibit proved very interesting and will certainly have the effect of raising the country in the estimation of those who see the display, we would judge that over four hundred took in the show here on Wednesday, and all appeared highly pleased with what they saw, the gentlemen in charge of the car were courteous, and anxious to give all necessary information. Those who did not see the exhibit missed a rare treat.
