The Judge in summing up the case charged strongly against the prisoner, after which the Jury retired and were absent about half an hour when they returned into court, rendering a yerdict of "Guilty" with recommendation to mercy. The Judge then addressed the prisoner asking him if he had any thing to say why the sentence of the the Court should not be pronounced upon him. The prisoner slowly arose to his feet, and addressed the court at considerable length, protesting his innocence. He said that one of the witnesses Aron Teeter swore falsly. He also denied the statement of Mrs. Leppard, her daughter and daughterin-law. He said that he had been wrongly dealt with by the people and
