Markdale Cheese Factory.

A meeting of the patrons of the above factory was held on the 13th iust., in the Orange Hall, Markdale, at the hour of 2 o'clock p.m., to wind up the business of the past year and to appoint officers and directors for the next.

The President and Secretary gave a statement of facts and figures regarding the past season, which were received by the meeting as entirely satisfactory.

The auditors' report followed, and testified to the satisfactory way business was done, when by resolution of meeting, reports were accepted and adopted as entirely satisfactory.

It was then moved in substance by Edward Rutledge and seconded by Wm. McLoughry, that although this being the first year of our factory, and as a consequence not so good from and an unfavorable fall, yet when we compare the result, we would have, if we manufactured our milk into butter and sold, say at 18 cents per lb., which is a high average for this season, with McDowell of Flesherton made this the result we have netted from giving the same quantity to the factory, we find there is a handsome balance in favor of cheese. Be it therefore resolved that we give the Markdale cheese factory our most hearty support in the coming and following seasons.—Carried unanimously.
