Pine lumber in unlimited quantities is wanted in the interior, and the Georgian Bay ports could supply this in abundance, and take in exchange, the products of the dairy and the farm, to supply the lumber shanties,

It is admitted by those who profess to know that at present the branch to Durham does not pay, hence it is absolutely necessary that it should be extended to some port on the Georgian Bay so as to share in the rapidly developing western trade. The present desire to see the school prosperous is deemed an opportune time to agitate such extension, and as Markdale is directly in the line, it is but reasonable firm believer and a weak follower of that the people of that village and neighborhood should take the initiative.
