To the Editor of the Standard.

DEAR SIR,—While the news of the recent fiendish attempt to blow up the Houses of Parliament in England 18 tresh in our minds and expressions of horror and indignation are universally heard and vows of vengeance freely uttered, I crave the liberty to give your readers a chapter of Irish History which may be new to many and interesting to all. While I would not for one moment seek to turn aside the fury of indignation from the per petrators of that diabolical crims; yet I would earnestly direct attention to the scource of all these troubles which afflict the British Nation, and thereby not only create a sympathy for but a desire and determination to do justice to that unhappy land which has for ages groaned under the lash of a tyranny more capricious than the once odious American Slavery and more cruel than Russian despotism.
