As soon as the woman ceased firing Rossa got up on his feet, with the assistance of a bystander, and started back for his office. He was prevailed upon to go to the Cuambers Street Hospital instead. He walked all the way, nearly a quarter of a mile. There it was found that only one ballet had pierced his body. It entered his back directly below the left shoulder blade. The physician at once began to probe for the ball. The wound is not considered dangerous. When Pat Joyce, in O'Donovan's office, was notified of the shooting he was surprised, as his chief had left the office only ten minutes before. He at once locked up the office and went to the hospital.

Cunning. ham was the only prisoner within the van, but several armed constables accompanied him. On each side of the driver was an armed policeman, and t ficers with exposed revolvers stood upon the steps. The conveyance was driven slowly to allow the armed escort to keep alongside, and enable the detectives who followed on the sidewalks to be near in case of emergency.

Police Captain McCullogh, of the 17th precinct, attended the meeting with a perse of men. Schevi son called the assembly to order, and the radical opponents of jected in such a way that a tumult enrued, in which chairs, clubs and revelvers figured. Captain McCullegh commanded alleuce and forced his way to the platform, fol. lowed by his men. Schwab saw him, and shouted, " It is the police! Kill the---!" The infarmed mob turned upon the ffiners and Capt. McCullogh was struck on the head with a chair and knocked down. He regained his feet, and at the joint of their revolvers the police kept the mob at bay. The Socialists then wanted to resume their deliberations, and supple. mented their demands by drawing clubs. knives and pistols.

Captain McCullogh was reinforced in a little while by thirty policemen. This enraged the crowd still further, and they again attacked the police, who responded with their clube, and the rioters were badly punished. Many heads were cracked. With the exception of Officer Rott, who was slightly out in the face, and a few bruises sustained by Captain McCulgh. noue of the policemen were injured. Peter Brown, one of the ricters, had his leg broken, and had to be sent to the hospital,

Justus Schwab was the only man arrested. He skulked away before the riot was over, but Captain McCullogh found him in his saloon on First street. He submitted quietly to arrest. Bail was refused and he was locked up. After the fight a pirtal, a dynamite bomb and several short black clubs were found in the hall. W. S. Rosenberg, Secretary of the International Workers' Association, said Schwab had asked O'Donovan Rossa to send a gang of his dynamiters to break up the meeting.
