The returns received by the Endowment Fund Committee from the different parishes of the Diocese of Niegara show the population of adult worshippers to be about 9,200. Many of the clergymen at the recent meeting of the Synod declared that the returns were inaccurate, inasmuch as the term adult worshipper" was under stood differently by different of the clergymen in making up the retures; some including persons of 17 years, others of 18 years, still others counting only those who had been confirmed, and some including only the males of their congregations. It was considered that complete returns would show a larger number than the figure given above.






