The Mard Fortune an Aged Finlander Found in This Country.

About two and a half years ago Jacob Karnele, a young Finlander, arrived in California, and found employment with a vine-grower. He soon, however, became insane, and word was sent to his father in Finland, and in due time his father arrived and started with his son for New York on their way back to Finland. On the night they started, the son, who did not recogn ze the father, disappeared. He was found, however, and did not escape again until their arrival in Philadelphia. A second time he was found. and the pair continued their journey to Jersey City, wher they were to take ship. This was about a month ago. One evening after the old man had been sitting with his son in a saloon he got up and started to go to their hotel. He was followed by one of Jersey City's gangs of hoodlums, who knecked the old father senseless and robbed him of all the money he had on this side of the Atlantic. At the first attack of the gang, the son, uttering a scream of fright, broke from his father's grasp and fled. The police found the father later, and cared for him. When he had recovered consciousness it was evident to the police that he was almost frantic to tell them something, but they could not understand his language, and could not even tell what language it was. More than twenty-four hours elapsed before a man could be found in Jersey City who could in erpret his story. Then he was kindly cared for, and search was made for his son. He could not be found.

The old man sent to Finland for more money, and in the meantime resumed the search for his son as best he could without money, friends, or a knowledge of English.

Toward the middle of last month a story was published that a mysterious person was frightening women in New Brighton Staten Island. Two women who were passing St. Mark's place one night were pounced upon and frightened half to death. A family living in a lonely street were sitting at supper one evening, when a tapping was heard at the window. A head of shaggy hair and a grinning face was seen peering into the room. They screamed and the face disappeared. The intruder could not be found. It is also said that this is the tramp through whose hat Mrs. Gordon sent a bullet from her pistol. At all eve te, the frightener of women was finally arrested, and was sent to the Kings county penetentiary for vagrancy and disorderly conduct. He could speak little English. Although his answers were wild, it was concluded that he was mot really insane. He would not tell his name.

About ten days ago the old man who had been robbed in Je sey City caled upon Dist. Atty. Gallagher, of Richmond county, and introduced himself as Jccob Karnele. By the aid of an interpreter he related his story, and said he believed the man who had been sentenced to prison for frightening women was his crazy son. He was sent to Crow Hill penitentiary in Kings county, and therehe found that his suspicions were correct.

Last week Justice Pratt ordered young Karnele to be released. A remittance had arrived from Finland, and father and son sailed for home on Saturday.

LUNCHEON DISHES.

SARDINE TOAST .- Drain all the oil from the fish, free them of bones and bruise them to a paste. Dust a little pepper through and a little lemon juice, spreading over slices of crisp toasted bread.

CUTLETS OF QUAIL OR PARTRIDGE -Cut the breasts from the quail or other dry meat bird, and at the small end of each insert a neat little piece of leg bone to look like cutlets. Dip into melted butter. season, roll in cracker crumbs and fry in hot butter, or broil if preferred. Serve with French peas in center of dish.

CHEESE TARTS. -Take the yolks of two fresh eggs, three dessert spoonfals of cream, a speck of cayenne pepper, a heaping tablespoonful of grated Parmeson or English cheese and a little salt. Beat these ingredients to a smooth paste; have made some tart shells of puff paste, fill with the mixture and bake in a quick oven until a light brown color.

CURRY OF COLD FOWL. -Two large onions, two apples, two ounces of butter, a large teaspoonful of curry powder, one teaspoonful of flour, half a pint of gravy, one tablespoonful lemon juice, two tomatoes, about a cup of cream or rich milk. Fry the fowl and onions in the butter, put into a at w pan, adding the gravy with the cooked apples, lemon juice and paste of curry powder and flour. Serve with hot boiled rice.

STEWED BEEF KIDNEY.—Split open and free it of all fat; cut in very small pieces and wash carefully in cold water, then let it stand in salt and water about an hour pass their stable and say nothing about them. to extract the blood. Have an onion chopped fine; cover with boiling water which must be poured off after the first few minutes boiling. Pour on more water and cook slowly for an hour; thicken the gravp with a little flour, adding a small lump of butter, pepper and salt to taste.

FRIED HARE.—Wash carefully, then let stand in salt and water to draw out the blood. Cut up as you would a chicken, dry each piece in a cloth, dip into flour and fry in hot butter or drippings.

A cream gravy of rich milk thickened with flour and butter, then well seasoned and poured over the rabbit, makes a tempting dish with but little to distinguish it from chicken if perfectly sweet

Gen. Sir Herbert Stewart, whose death in the Soudan from a bullet wound received at the battle of Abu Klen where with a handful of men, he defeated 10,-000 Arabs, was announced recently, was the eldest son of Rev. E. Stewart, the late rector of Sharaholt, near Winchester in Hampshire. He was born in 1842, and entered the British service in 1863. Five years later he was appointed a cap tain in the 3:d Dragoon Guards. After holding several appointments on the staff, he brought himself into prominent notice curing the late troubles with the Beers in the Transvaal, and was taken prisoner with others in the disaster at Majuba Hil'. On his return to England he held some less prominent appointments, but in 1882 he volunteered for service in the first Egyptian campaign, obtaining the rank of chief of the staff of the cavalry brigade under Gen. Sir Drury Lowe, and will be remembered as the leader of the renowned rapid advance on Cairo after the eventful

DOWNFALL OF TEL-EL KEBIR, being the first to enter the Egyptian capital, and to whom Arabi Pasha, his staff, a ds. c of hs army as were with hum surrendered themselves as prisoners. For these services he was rewarded by the Queen with substantial promotion. On the outbreak of the troubles in the Soudan he assumed command of the cavalry brigade in the expeditionary force under Sir Gerald Graham, and so distinguished himself during the campaign that on his return to England he was promoted to the rank of colonel, and was made a K.C.B He subsequently was appointed to the command of the corps of marines selected to assist the Irish constabulary in quelling disturbances in that country, and on its being decided to send an expedition for the relief of Khartoum, Col. Stewart again placed his services in the hands of the government. His gallant conduct in Egypt, his victory at Abu Klea, his death wound, and the fatal termination are the last painful chapters in the life of an English soldier who, knowing what his duty was, did it with his whole heart, giving his youth, his manhood, his experience, and personal courage, and, last of all, his life also for his beloved England.

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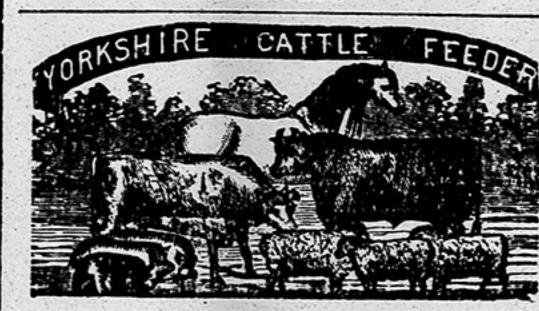
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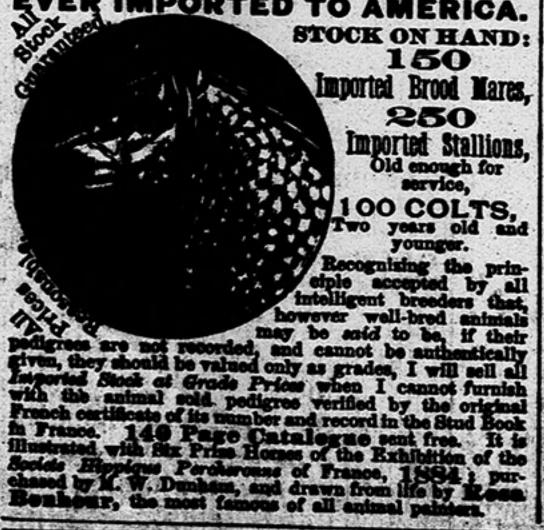
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
