Disgusting Details-How the Victim was Mutilated-The Beart of the Murdered Man Hanging Up in a Basket.

White, charged with the murder of Simon A. Vanderco k, at Austerli'z, N. Y, on Jan. 10, 1832, was brought before Judge Boyd, for extradition to the United States, on Monday, the 2nd inst., in Toronto.

District Attorney Gardinier was the first witness called. He said he liv-d in the village of Vilit'æ, in the county of Columbia, and was an Attorney-at-law. He produced copies of the deposition of Harrison Calkins, D L. Spanding, U. H. Hinman, Russell Harvey, Wm. Mory, and Allan Hanor, taken before Harvey G. Kinney, a justice of the peace of Austerlitz, on February 6 and 7, 1885. These were true copies, and were cu'y cert.fied.

Mr. Fenton then proceeded to read the following evidence :- Harrison Calkins deposed: I live about three-quarters of a mile from Beckwith's place, and I knew both Beckwith and Vandercock; they were interested in some mining property; they were not on good terms. Vandercook was superintendent of the stock company. Beckwith lived in a shanty on the mountain in the State of New York. The last time I saw Vandercock was on Jan. 10th, 1882. I returned from Pittsfield that day, and not finging him I went to Beckwith's shanty. When reached there I smelled something off nsive. I went in, and Beckwith was there. The top of the stove was red hot. I asked him about Vandercook, and he said he had gone to my house toget some clothes, and that he, Vandercook, was going away, and would not be back until March. When I asked him about his having such a fire, he said he had some baking to do. I could not see inside the stove. The smell and sound was like mest frying. When I got back home I found that Vandercook had not been there. The next day I continued to search in other directions and found nothing of him. On Thursday I went up to Beckwith's shanty, broke in the door, examined the stove, and found bones and signs of cloth. The rest of the remains were all mutilated and were found in the other room. This was a small room adjoining the room where the stove was, and had a bed in it. It was a room about 5x12 feet. Found flesh piled up there, and some articles that belonged to Vandercook. Among them was part of a mitten, one that my wife made for him. This belonged to Vandercook. A sack coat was also found, also one boot and one Arctic rubber. I identify all the clothing found as belonging to Vandercook. I also found two axes; one covered with blood looked very dull. There was not much furniture in the shanty. I knew Beckwith he is about five feet six inches tall, his eyes were always cast down, and he had a bad look. He was between 70 and 80 years old, but looked younger. He was a desperate character. Vandercook was a well-disposed man, and not quarrelsome. The murder must have taken place between 11 and 5 o'clock on the 10th of January, 1882. The thumb of Vandercook's left hand had been off for some time, the result of an accident. This hand was not found among the remains at the cabin. I am satisfied in my own mind that the hand found among the remains at the cabin was the hand of Vandercook, and my opinion is based on the size and shape of it. Dr. D. L. Spaulding, of Austerlitz. N.

Y., deposed: On January 13, 1882, I made an examination of the remains of a man. I found them in a promiscuous pile upon the floor of a shanty, situate about three miles southeast of the village of Austerlitz in the mountains near the Massachusetts line. The remains bore the appearance of having been chopped in pieces wich an axe. The head and neck, left forearm and hand, both legs below the knees, both feet, liver, a part of the spinal column and the left hip were missing. The breast bone and abdominal walls were divided through the center. Both lower extremeties were severed from the body, through or near the hip joint; each was again severed at about the upper third, and again about the middle third of each thigh. Both legs and feet were severed from the thigh be low the knee, or at about the upper third of the leg, and the lower parts thereof were missing. The arms were sevired from the body through or near the shoulder joint. Each arm was then severed about the junction of the middle with the upper third of the arm bone. Both f rearms were again severed at about the junction of the upper and middle thi d of forearm bones. The left forearm and hand from that point were also miss ng. The right hip was severed from the left just right of the spinal column, that part of the spinal column being found with burned left hip. The left kidney and lungs were found in the dissected pile on the bed-room floor. The other kidney, heart and bowels were found in a halfbushel basket. Russed Harvey, a constable, testified to going into the cabin on January 12 and finding the stove full of Juman bones. He said: I opened the door to the side raom where Beckwith slept. Underneath a sort of bed, which was about three feet from the ground, I found a lot of clothes, and I pulled them away and four da pile of meat, with an axe on top of the pile. I also found an Arctic subber and a boot cut down through t'e leg. The pants were also cut up through each leg. handled the firsh and am positive that it was human flesh. Found one hand cut off about half way between the elbow and wrist, leaving hand and forearm. There was a half-bushel basket containing intestines and heart. It was hanging up in the side room. The flesh was cut up in pieces and piled as stated. I found an axe on the top of the pile; its handle was bloody and it was greasy. The meat looked as if it had been carried in the basket. Beckwith was about seventy years of age and always had a bad reputation.

Wm. Morey deposed: I live in Austerli'z. A week before the murder I met Backwith near the red bridge and had a talk with him. He said he wished that or some one else would get Vandercock out of the way. He said, "You can do it and I would know nothing about it.

Allan Hanor deposed as follows : Beckwith once told me that he had been cheated by Vandercook and he would kill him in less than a year. He told me this at Ambrose Wolsey's place in the fall of 1881. He said he would like to have someone to help him to kill Vandercook. He said he thought Vandercook carried about \$300 with him. He said, "It's nothing to kill a man; just take an axe and strike him on the head."

After these depositions had been put in Sheriff Humphrey, ex-Sheriff Hanor and District Attorney Gardiner were examined, and identified the prisoner as Oscar F. Beckwith, who was wanted for the murder of Vandercook.

A warrant for his extradition was issued by Judge Boyd.




