United States New Postal Law

To take effect on and after July 1

1—Sealed letter to go anywhere in the United States for 2 cents on each full ounce or fraction of an ounce, instead of one half an ounce. Any letter not over one full ounce for cents; over 1 ounce and up to 2 ounces, 4 conts, and so on. The full ounce weight will apply to drop letters delivered for one cent where the carrier system is not in operation.

2-Registered newspapers, sent by publishers or by news-dealers, one cen per pound, to include regular and specimen copies.—Other papers sent by any one, one cent for each 4 ounces or fraction of 4 ounces.

3-Articles in newspapers may be marked with pen or pencil to call attention to them, but no words or figures can be used. This is not now allowed to publishers sending papers by pound rates.

For early potatoes, plant in good, rich, mellow soil as soon as the frost is out of the ground. You can hardly plant too early. Until the plants appear, severe frost will not burt them. When the plants are up, a frost will some times destroy the crop, or at any rate, seriously retard or injure it. A piece of paper, or a light covering of soil will save the plant. For winter 217-269 potatoes, select a variety that possesses at least four points, viz ; quality, vigorous growth of leaves to resist the

potato bugs, a good keeper, and pro

ductiveness.

When the potatoe bugs first appeared, everybody planted early varieties of potatoes, in hopes of getting ahead of the bugs. Now that he know how to keep the bugs in check, we can plant later kinds. As a rule, the early varieties cannot yield as well as the later sorts, which have a longer season to grow in; or if they do inexceptional cases, it is probably owing to unusual richness of land. On ordinary land, other things being equal, a late variety will yield better, and keep better (the next spring). than the early varieties. 
