TRAMPS.—On Wednesday night 18th a number of tramps broke into the Orange Hall, Holland Centre, and demanded a night's lodging from the Goat, which was unwillingly granted. The following morning the goat's boss was informed of the intrusion when a complaint was lodged with the J. P., and a warrant issued for the capture of the guilty ones, Constables, Vogan, Greenaway, Telford and Dunbar were at once dispatched in pursuit of the fugitives. Dunbar captured two, but, to his great chagrin they both made good their escape. The other three were, however, arrested and tried before Justice Price and Hamilton, and sentenced to three days imprisonment in gaol, thereby securing for themselves, (the prisoners) board and lodging for that length of time, together with a free ride to Owen Sound, while their more unfortunate chums who escaped had to foot it or pay for or beg their rations. The Queen of course paid the costs of the court. Damage to hall a broken lock and chewed drumstick.

THERE is a big lawsuit on hand between the O. S. Steamship Company and the C. P. R. When the O. S. Steamship Company was organized, an agreement was entered into with the Toronto, Grey and Bruce, by which they were to have the exclusive right to carry freight to and from the railway at Owen Sound for three years. When the T. G. & B. R. became absorbed in the Ontario and Quebec, the latter road assumed the agreement. Meanwhile the C. P. R. constructed their steel steamers, and though it was at first announced that they would run from Algoma Mills, Owen Sound was found to be the more convenient place, and they were brought here. While our citizens generally were rejoicing that these magnificent boats were making our harbor their headquarters, the O. S. Steamship Co. were concerned for their agreement, which was interfered with by the new arrangement, and failing to get any satisfaction from the C. P. R. as well as having some other claims unsettled, on Monday they issued a writ for \$40,000 for services rendered, and \$150,000 for alleged breach of contract, retaining D. McCarthy, Q. C., and Chas. Moss, Q. C., as counsel.—O. S. Times.
