Fleating Scoria From the Java Eruption.

Tae following interesting account of ashes and pumice from the volcanic eruption on the island of Java in 1883, found affoat at sea in January last, is furnished from the log of the Antelope of Boston:

From the 14th to the 15th of January, betwen latitudes 1 degree and 4 degrees south, and longitudes 83 degrees and 84 degrees east, we passed through quantities of pumice-stone and ashes. At times the see appeared to be literally covered by it. The large pieces were heavily weighted with marine growths, and many pieces appeared to be on the point of sinking.

We picked up a small quantity of it, and among it found a small and very peculiar shaped fish, somewhat resembling a turbot. We may mention that a large number of fish similar to the one we caught and a fish resembling an alewive, also lots of small crabs, were among the pumice, and they all appeared to be busily engaged swimming from piece to piece eating barnacles, etc.

The pumice is, no doubt, part of that thrown up by the terrible eruption which occurred in Java Aug. 25 to 28 1883, and therefore, has been affoat some 500 days. We were surprised to find it in this particular position, and more surprised to find any of it affoat at all after such a lapse of time.

About the 28th of September last the see beach of Natal, south west Africa, was covered by pumice, cast ashore by the sea. The pumice must have begun its journey about the 28 h of August, 1883, and In 397 days it had drifted—taking Java as its point of departure—a distance of 4,400 miles, or 11 geographical miles per day.

This is certainly a most instructive illustration of the westerly current we always expect when crossing the Indian ocean toward the Cape of Good Hope.

But how did the pumice reach the position in which we found it in such quanti-

We can only form conjectures as to the probable course it took. The equatorial carrent, which originally started this large quantity of pumice and ashes and landed part of it on the African coast, runs from Javain one large body, to about latitude 18 degress south longitude 70 de grees east; here it divides into two branches one flowing southwest, and the other westnorthwest, toward Madagascar. So say the writers on ocean currents.

Ships which arrived at Bombay during last August and September, and passed east of Madagascar, report large fields of pumice off of this island; this comprises o repart of our conjecture. The current proceeding to the north west and reaching to the north point of Madagascar again divides itself, one branch entering the Mozambique channel and running to the southwest; the other, continuing its course to the northwest eventually strikes the African shore to the northward of Zanzibar, and is turned off to the northward, and again, after having been whirled around, and held in bondage as it were, for a time by conflicting currents and the changing monsoons, part of it is carried to the position in which we found it in such quantities by the easterly currents which prevail about the equator during the northwest monsoon; and hear it will again be held by changeable currents until eventually it becomes sufficiently weighted by marine growths and sinks to the bottom.

Part of the large field of pumice, which originally started from Java, will no doubt be carried to the southward of Agulhas bank, off the Cape of Good Hope where the currents are very strong, and turning sharply from the southwest to the southward and southeast, will reach the well know easterly drift, which flows all the year round, and is so favorable to ships bound to Australia when they are south of 40 degrees latitude, and eventually be landed on the coasts of Australia and New Zealand. Trus in the end many thousands of miles will separate what was once a portion of Java.

I may mention that we passed small quantities of it in the South Atlantic. The last we saw of it was when we were about 500 miles to the northwestward of the Cape of Good Hops.

A Captive King.

The authorities of the Maritime Hossital at Brest have, at the present monent, under their guardianship a king, ecently brought to France as a prisoner eswar. His realms are situated near orto Novo, on the west coast of Africa; and while wandering about his dominions King Humbo, quite oblivious of his oath of fidelity, incited his subjects to rebel against the French, when their Marine Infantry were recently landed in Senegal.

He was slightly wounded by the French oldiers, and being captured, was shipped off to France in very depressed spirits. Although treated with every consideration in the Brest Hospital, this sableskinned monarch declines, it is said, to take a cheerful view of life, and appears to be pining after freedom. He can converse with no one, there being nobody who understands his language, so he is obliged to make known his wants by signs. When requested, on his arrival the first night, to undress before going to bed, he very energetically refused to do so, and ever since he persists in keeping his clothes on night and day. King Humbo seems to have conceived a strong attachment for the doctor of the ward in which he is placed; and, now that he is becoming convalescent, he evinces his attachment by diligently brushing that gentleman's clothes whenever he gets an opportunity of making himself useful in this manner. It is not intended to detein the captive monarch in France. When quite recovered from his wound he will be restored to his faithful subjects.

Business Enterprise.

After the discovery of gold in California in 1848, says the Overland, and before any communication was had with American or European commercial ports, the demand for supplies of almost every kind became often oppressive. There were no railways, no telegraph, no steamships by which communication could be made; no intimation when any ship would approach the coast, yet it was of the utmost importance to the merchant that he obtain the earliest opportunity to board an incoming vessel, and make such purchases as would in a measure forestall the efforts of his rivals.


