HOMEWARD MARCH.

The Troops to Return From the North-West in about 3 weeks.

Mann, farm instructor, Frog Lake; Mrs. Mann and three children, Malcolm Macdonald, H. B. Clerk, at Frog Lake; John Fitzpatrick, farm instructor at Onion Lake; Stanly Simpson, H. B. Clerk, at Pitt; Robert Hodgson, cook to McLean; John Simpson, H. B. factor at Frog Lake, and Joseph Perrin. Twenty-two in all.

Unfair Tactics.

There are persons in this world who are difficult to deal with, whose love of self so far over-rides their better qualities as to render their actions unintelligible to their fellowmen.

A case in point: Last season one of the patrons of Markdale cheese factory took umbrage at a fancied loss he sustained in not being paid for a slight service he performed, which is always a gratuitous one when performed by others; hence he withdrew his patronage this season. A short time since the market report of the Toronto Mail contained an item which showed that cheese had fallen 80 per cent. in price, but added that this was caused by speculators entering into a "ring," or boycotting cheque, and that cheese would soon go up in value, as the same thing had happened six years ago, and that the foreign market was as steady as ever. The individual referred to clipped out that portion of the article in question which announced the depression, but omitted the explanation, and exhibited this to every one he met, both in town and country. Now, it is a recognized principle in the ethics of truth, that to withhold a portion of a subject with a view to producing a false impression, is a deliberate falsehood on the part of the garbler. There are one of two—or both—reasons for this gentleman's conduct. He either wishes to injure the cheese factory, or else to depreciate the value of cows in the estimation of those who had them to dispose of. The depression of six years ago only lasted a month or six weeks, and already the cheese market is steadily advancing, and there are the best of reasons for believing that it will reach its former maximum figure in less than thirty days.

The Council met as a Court of Revision, pursuant to adjournment on 13th June 1885. Members all present. The following changes were made in the assessment Roll for the current year viz:—

Fawcett assessed for 10 acres of lot 6, con. 5; S $\frac{1}{2}$ lot 10, con. 5, assessed to Richard Baker at \$1,800; N $\frac{1}{2}$ lot 2, con. 6, placed on Non. Res. Roll; The description of John W. Knott's assessment corrected; S $\frac{1}{2}$ lot 15, con. 7, placed on Non-Res. Roll; William Thornton assessed jointly with Robert Thornton; Saml. J. Martin placed on roll as farmer's son; John Curry placed on the roll as owner for S. p. lot 23, con. 5; John W. Currie placed on the roll as owner of W $\frac{1}{2}$ lot 13, con. 6; corrections were made in the assessments of R. Gardner and R. Johnston; John Fawcett placed on the roll as owner part lot 6, con. 5; A. W. Rawlings assessed jointly with J. R. Rawlings, pt. lot 4, con. 1; Joseph Boyd assessed

jointly with James Boyd, Esq., pt. lot 21, con. 8; John Kerr's assessment confirmed. A resolution was passed finally confirming the roll as now revised, and ordering the clerk to certify to the same as required by statute.

The Court arose.

Council resumed at 2 o'clock p. m. Members all present. Minutes of last session of Council read and confirmed.

The Reeve's orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay as follows: Hezekiah Loughed, \$12 labour, Beaver River bridges; Hugh Patton, \$30, chopping and clearing side line 21 and 22, con. 11; James Wilson, \$1.50 work on 9th line, at lot 6.

The Reeve was appointed to get culvert repaired on 18 and 19 side line, con. 4. The use of the Town Hall was granted to the Orangemen to hold their County Lodge Meeting. Mr. Hurd appointed to let job on 9 and 10 side line, con. 2. Mr. Hurd Authorized to expend \$75, on Valley crossway. Mr. Fawcett authorized to let job on 15 and 16 side line. The Reeve and Mr. Boyd appointed to get approaches built to bridge on side line 3 and 4, con. 10.

Mr. Boyd appointed to get repairs made on 9th line at lots 7 and 8. \$10 was granted to George Vickers, Esq., Pathmaster, to assist in repairing culverts in his road division. The Reeve was appointed to get to culverts built on 27 and 28 side roads, con. 6.

William Kerr authorized to perform 4 days statute labor on blind line between 1st and 2nd concessions. \$25 was granted to improve 15 and 16 side road between the 5th line and 7th line, said amount to be expended by William J. Loughed, pathmaster.

On motion of Messrs. Boyd and Hurd a resolution was passed that no member of council let jobs on the roads without the concurrence of the council board except when danger to the travelling community is apprehended.

The clerk was ordered to get the voters' list for the current year printed at the Mirror office Meaford.

Council adjourned until the first Saturday in July next.

Moved by Mr. Shute, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That the Reeve be empowered to make arrangements with the new proprietor of the hotel as to using the hall of the Council room.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Shute, That the taxes charged against west part lot 15, con. 2, be assessed and charged against the west part 13, Con. 2.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded

by Mr. Howey, That the Reeve be empowered to engage a Solicitor to defend the matter of appeal in the C. P. R. case.

Moved by Mr. Shute, seconded by Mr. Galbraith, That \$25 be granted to the village of Chatsworth to be expended on McNabb street to repair culverts and graveling, and that the Pathmaster of the village be empowered to regulate the same.

Moved by Mr. Shute, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That the petition of Mr. Boyle and others be laid over for further consideration.

The communication of W. J. Winters with regard to flooding his barnyard with water on account of the ditches not being deep enough was attended to and the clerk instructed to notify the pathmaster of the best of the obstruction.

Moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. Williscroft, That the clerk notify the Messrs. Stevenson to remove Fence off road allowance opposite F. McCann's on side hill, or if not taken before next meeting of Council proceedings will be taken to have it removed and charged it to the offending party.

The money for the Township roads to be apportioned as follows:—Ward No. 1, \$100. John Cameron inspector; Ward No. 2, \$120; M. Howey, inspector; Ward No. 3, \$100, T.
