**Euphrasia Council**  
The Council met pursuant to ad-  
journment on the 29th of August, '85.  
Members all present; Minutes of last  
meeting of Council read and confirmed.  
The Reeve and Mr. Hurd were  
authorized to take bonds from R.  
Thompson and W. Stewart, Esqs., for  
the building of the bridges over  
Beaver River on the valley road.

Rodger Bowser authorized to ex-  
pend \$25 improving road at Kerr's  
hill, side line 21 and 22.  
Mr. Boyd was authorized to make  
repairs on Quinton's hill. Mr. Shep-  
herdson and Mr. Boyd, instructed to  
get repairs made on 24th and 25th  
side lines, 9th and 10th concessions.  
Mr. Hurd authorized to let a job on  
8rd line on lot 2.

The Clerk was ordered to adver-  
tise survey of new road to pass  
through lots 1, 2, and 3, con. 5.  
The Reeve, Deputy-Reeve, Mr.  
Boyd and the Clerk, were appointed a  
financial committee to ascertain the  
assets and liabilities of the Township  
with a view to the levying of the rates.  
Said committee reported that 7  
mills in the dollar of the assessed  
valuation of the Township will be suf-  
ficient to meet and cover interest on  
railway debentures, Sinking Fund to  
meet said debentures, county rates,  
school equivalent, roads and bridges,  
and all other expenses of the Town-  
ship, except school debentures and  
rates required by school trustees.

Said report was accepted and ap-  
proved by Council.  
By-law 850 to levy the rates for the  
current year was carried through the  
different stages and passed.  
By-law 351, appointing James  
Struthers, Esq., arbitrator on Union  
school business, was carried through  
the different stages and passed.

The Reeve's orders were issued on  
the Treasurer to pay as follows, viz:  
John Sewell, \$5, blasting rock on  
27th and 28th side road; Edward  
Fawcett, \$3.95, work on Heathcote  
bridge; George Emery, \$32.50, to  
pay men for work on town line; A.  
H. McLean, \$50, payment for land  
taken for road; George Vickers, Esq.,  
\$10, to pay for work on 27th and 28th  
side road; Robert Vary, \$5.50, re-  
moving stone from 18th and 19th  
side line; George Craikbank, \$6,  
work on Heathcote bridge; Henry  
Hurd, \$5, to pay for work on 8rd line  
at lot 2; George Booth, \$2.50, pro-  
tecting Heathcote bridge; Hugh Fer-  
guson, \$4.50, work on town line St.  
Vincent; Hamilton McLean, \$25,  
work on 9th line at lot 23; Robert  
Cannon, \$16.90, gravelling 15th and  
16th side line; Geo. Richardson, Esq.,  
\$4, repairing bridge 9th line; John  
Pritchard, \$14, building culvert and  
ditching; Robert Drummond, \$28.50,  
covering crossway at line 27 & 28;  
Edward Manning, \$4, repairing road  
scrapers.

Council adjourned until the last  
Saturday in September next.

be paid \$3, for work on road at lot  
41, con. 3, N. D. R.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McMillan, Seconded  
by Mr. McCuaig, That B. H. Towns-  
end be paid \$1, for advertising Court  
of Revision.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Neil, That the Council  
of Egrement be requested to grant an  
equivalent to 23 days Statute Labor  
performed by Glenelg, opposite lots  
12 to 23, inclusive on Townline  
between Egrement and Glenelg.—  
Carried.

Moved by Mr. Neil, Seconded by  
Mr. Dunsmore, That the arrears of  
taxes against E. J. of lot 3, on the South  
Side of Mill St. Markdale for 1884, be  
struck off the Roll, the same having  
been an error in assessment.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dunsmore, Seconded  
by Mr. Neil, That \$5, be granted  
to Robert Bell as charity, the money  
to be placed in the hands of James  
Whitmore for expenditure.—Carried.
