

Fall Assizes.

ALMOND DRINKWATER was arraigned and pleaded guilty to the forgeries he was accused of.

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill against Thos. B. Gilliland for perjury, and against John Bell and Aaron Boynton for stealing from the person.

INSETTER vs. TOTTEN & HAYES.—The defendants has a judgment against John Insetter, and seized some telegraph poles which were claimed by Wm. Insetter, the plaintiff. This was an Interpleader suit to which the property belonged. Verdict for the plaintiff. Creasor & Morrison for plaintiff. Plaintiff for defendant Totten, and Masson & Masson for defendant Hayes.

GREEN vs. JAS. WHITE.—The prisoner was indicted for a nuisance in having a glandered horse on the highway. The evidence was very conflicting, and the jury failed to agree. A. Frost for the Crown. J. M. Kilbourn for the defence.

FRIDAY.

WM. H. WHITE, for receiving horse stolen to be stolen, was sentenced to six months in Central Prison; and Almond Drinkwater, for forgery, to five years in Penitentiary.

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill against J. P. Connor for conspiracy.

GREEN vs. JNO. BELL AND AARON BOYNTON.—The prisoners were accused of robbing Reginald Campbell, jr., of a sum of money in Hazelton. The prosecutor told a circumstantial story of being at Bell's Hotel Singhampton, of starting home walking the two prisoners with him, and of Bell putting his hand in his pocket and taking the money. After hearing two or three of the witnesses for the defence, His Lordship stopped the case and ordered the prisoners to be discharged, saying that he charitably took Campbell's testimony as arising from the vagaries of a drunken man, or he would have him indicted for perjury. BURPEE vs. M'RAE.—This was an action brought by the township of Burpee against A. C. M'rae on a bond for \$3,000, by which he bound himself to erect a grist and saw mill within the township. Judgment reserved. Jno. Creasor, Q. C., and S. Platt for plaintiffs. A. P. Cameron for defendant.

THE EDMA MINE CASE.

GREEN vs. CONNORS.—This was the celebrated conspiracy case against P. J. Connors, a detective from the Pinkerton Agency, Chicago, which has created a great deal of interest in this locality. He was charged with conspiracy with others to defraud Mrs. Billings and members of her family, by obtaining their interests in the celebrated Edma Mine, of which Mrs. Billings' first husband, Mr. Woods, was one of the original discoverers, without adequate compensation. The main facts of how a Mr. Moody, learned that Woods left a widow in Canada, and from Colorado in search of her; how the other side learning what he was about, got a detective on his track, who shadowed him from Chicago, and finally got to Owen Sound and saw Mrs. Billings, ahead of him. The readers are already familiar with. The jury tried to prove the great value of the mine by the first witness, Moody, who was present at a trial in Colorado, and heard the case stated on oath by a person who had charge of the books, but His Lordship ruled that this kind of secondary evidence was not admissible. The principal facts brought out at the trial were as follows:—Mr. Moody was an Attorney in Colorado, was employed by a woman there who was thought to be the lawful widow of Mr. Woods, to look after her interest, and his wife bought her share for a very small sum. There being that there was an "original widow" in Canada, he came here with the intention of getting her to entrust her business to him and give him a share if he got the property. When the detective got ahead, and with his two friends got the confidence of Mrs. Billings, she asked \$40,000 for her share, from the information of value which Moody had given her; but on representation that her claim was doubtful, and that they were only paying her something to prevent litigation, they got her to give a quit claim deed of her interest for \$2,500. After signing this and getting her money, Mrs. Billings was then induced by others to make a trust deed to R. J. Doyle, the terms of which were agreed by another agreement, by which it appeared that Moody was to get half for retaining the property, and he was to give 20 per cent. for his services—10 per cent. for himself, and the other 10 per cent.

\$2,500 coming to the family, \$1,000 of which had already been given to his mother, and one-sixth of the remainder was for him, but he was generous, and gave \$270 for an assignment of his share. At this point His Lordship intervened, and said that as there was no evidence of the value of the mine, it would be impossible to show that they had been defrauded, and directed an acquittal. Two other indictments against Connor for a similar offence were also dismissed. A. Frost for the Crown. D. McCarthy, Q. C., and Masson & Masson for defendant.

ORE vs. FARWELL.—This was a case in which the Postmaster at Fairmount and his wife sued the publisher of the Thornbury Standard for libel, in a series of articles against them in his paper. The evidence brought out the whole gossip of the village; but the jury came to the conclusion that the criticisms were not too severe, and brought in a verdict for defendant. Jas. Masson and J. Birnie for plaintiffs. J. Creasor, Q. C., and R. H. Evans for defendant.

The Court concluded at noon on Saturday, several cases being left over for another Court.

RIOT AND FIRE.—Last night about 10:30 the fire bell alarm was sounded, and a big rush was made in the direction of Bay street to ascertain the whereabouts of the fire it was discovered to be at the Clifton House, where a riot was at full blast. Fred Atterberry, off the Algoma and two Americans by the name of Holmes were having a free fight with stones, spittoons, bottles and miscellaneous weapons. Chandeliers were knocked down and lamps smashed on all sides, which resulted in considerable damage to the house by fire. Constable Spense appeared on the scene, and in his usual affable way invited the rioters to accompany him to "Her Majesty's residence" for the night. There were three other arrests made at or near the Clifton House about the same time by Constable Pearce, Frank Mitchell, Cadman, and Charles Murray, the first of whom had a set of burglars tools and about half a pound of powder in his possession. Two or three of the prisoners have been employed for some weeks past lathing at Knox Church. All the prisoners were brought up before the Police Magistrate this morning, and remanded for one week to await developments.—O. S. Advertiser.

Rebellion Claims.

MR. OUMET SAYS THE DAMAGE IS NOT AS GREAT AS REPORTED.

MONTREAL, Oct. 9.—Alphonse Oumet, advocate of the city, who has just returned from the North West, where he was engaged since July last as a government commissioner in assessing the damage to property by the rebellion, says the damage is by no means as great as generally reported. At Battleford, Batouche and Fish Creek the loss is the greatest, and it was principally sustained through Poundmaker and his band. The principal applicants for damages are storekeepers, whose premises were rifled of goods of all kinds, including firearms. The effects of the rebellion, Mr. Oumet said, have passed away, and now that the Metis have had their land claims finally settled they are going to work actively. Mr. Oumet denies that the halfbreeds are in want, as stated, of food, as the government agents have supplied them with abundance wherever it was needed. He concluded by expressing his opinion that the Northwest is a magnificent country and only requires to be opened up by railways to be quickly settled.

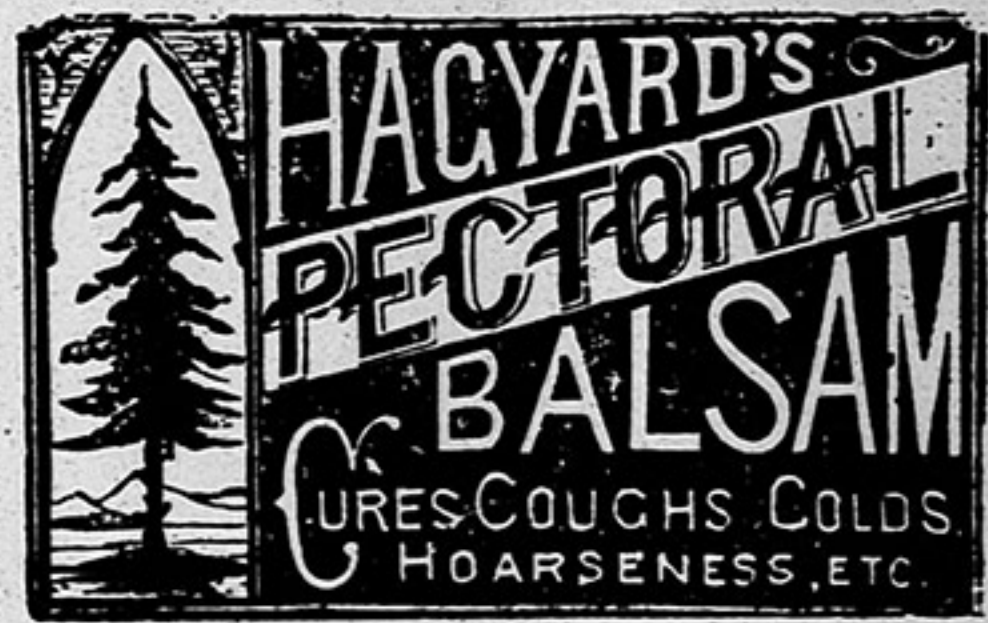

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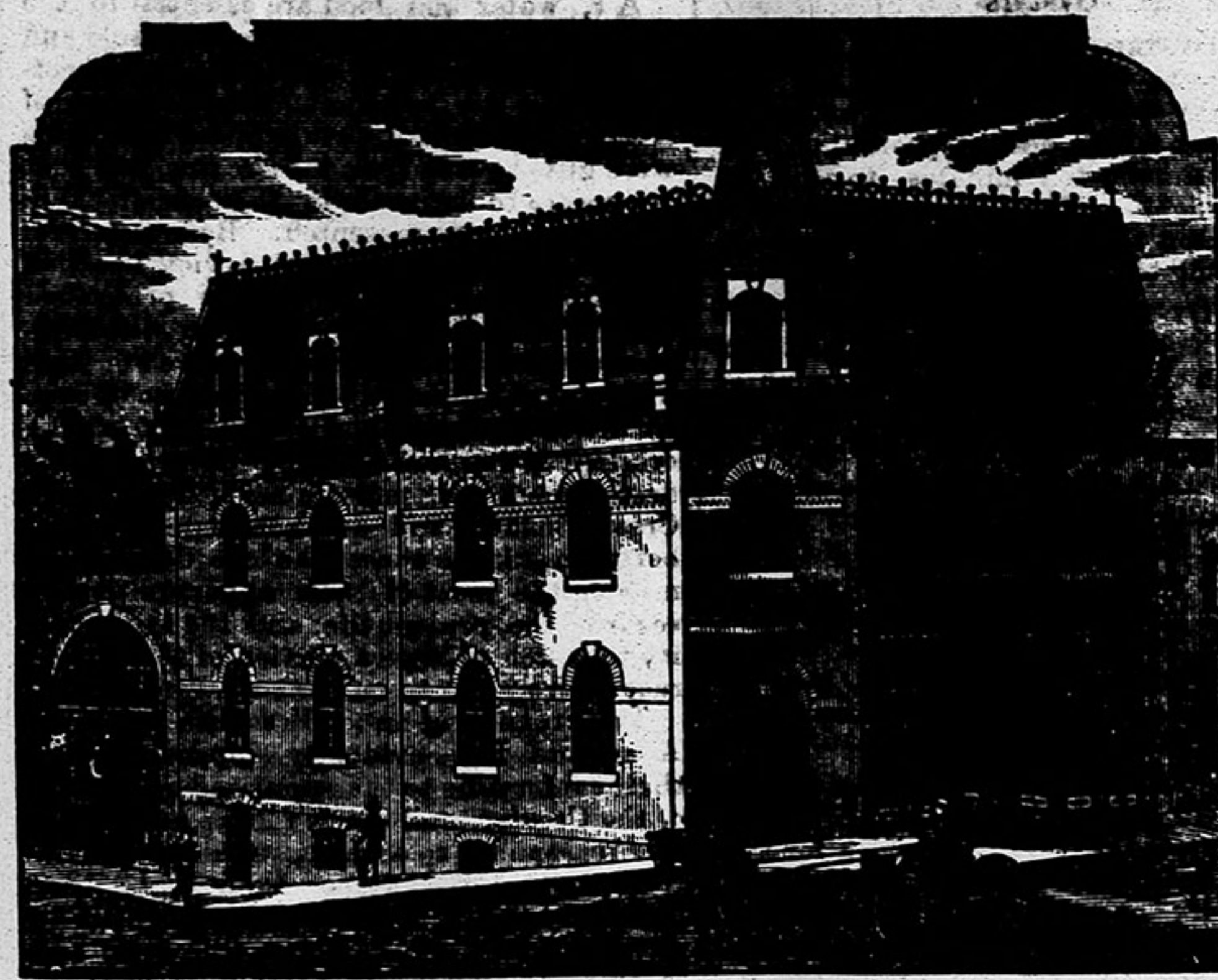
