MR. OUIMET SAYS THE DAMAGE IS NOT AS GREAT AS REPORTED.

MONTREAL, OCT. 9 .- Alphonse Ouimet, advocate of the city, who has just returned from the North West, where he was engaged since July last The Funniest Paper in America as a government commissioner in assessing the damage to property by the rebellion, says the damage is by no means as great as generally reported. 


