This is often done by buyers who shift from place to place, seldom remaining in one place more than one sesson, thus wholly disinter; ested as to the reputation of the market in years to follow.

Then again, our village has superior advantages on account of the large > steam elevators, so convenient to the market, and where produce can be unloaded with ease and dispatch, so that we need not wonder the distance farmers are driving in order to secure those advantages. Last week there were from 75 to 100 loads per day, many of them from more than half way to Collingwood, and some from a few miles from Thornbury, and all leaving well pleased with the result of their trip.
