The holiday season has come and the municipal elections are over, and everybody has again got busy settled down to the duties of the Sabbath. Our brass band serenaded the successful candidates in the evening, after which a large gathering assembled in the town hall and witnesses were delivered by the Reeve, Mr. Christie, and councillor Pickell and several other prominent men. Mr. band boys always act like gentlemen and are treated as such. The Dr. and Mr. Pickell contributed liberally to their fund on Monday evening.
