SAUGREN.—The presbytery met in Mount Fores on 15th December. Mr. Straith presented a call from the Durham congregation, signed by 106 members and 61 adherents, in favor of Mr. Robert McNair, licentiate; salary \$900 per annum without manse. The call was sustained, and the clerk instructed to forward it to Mr. McNair. Mr. Nichol tendered his resignation of North Luther, Ross and Gordonville on account of an affection of the throat. The representatives from the congregations, while deeply regretting that he had been compelled to do so, could not under the circumstances offer any objections. His resignation was accepted, and Mr. Thom was appointed to declare the pastoral charge vacant on the first Sabbath of January. Delegates from Alton, East Normanby, North Luther and Ross were present, asking for more satisfactory connections then they had at present. After considering the different positions and conditions of all the fields concerned, it was agreed to cite all parties to appear for their interests at next meeting. Mr. Ross, of Dundalk, was appointed to organize Corbetton and Riverview into mission stations. The Aged and infirm Ministers' Fund, Manitoba College and the Augmentation Scheme were all duly considered. A committee was appointed to take charge of the Augmentation Scheme, and parties were appointed to visit supplemented congregations. It was agreed that in view of the financial difficulties of the college, and in view of the fact that a committee on consolidation of the colleges, has been appointed by the Assembly, the system of lectureships should be continued for the present. The next meeting of presbytery was appointed to be held in Knox church, Harrison, on the 16th day of March next, at 11 a. m. —[Presbyterian Review.

Euphrasia Council.

The council met pursuant to adjournment at McConnel's hotel, Rocklyn, on the 24th December, 1885. Members all present. Minutes of last session of council read and confirmed.

\$7 was struck off J. Kaakes taxes on account of loss by fire.

\$2 struck off Thompson Allan's taxes, said amount being charged in error for statute labor.

The collector's time was extended. \$6 was struck off taxes charged to Thomas Ellis, this amount of error caused by error of assessment.

By-law No. 357, regulating indemnity of council, carried through the different stages and passed.

By-law No. 358, appointing a place for polling in polling subdivision No. 3, was carried through the different stages and passed.

The treasurer was ordered to remit as follows, viz:—To J. Farwell, \$18.28, printing; J. Rutherford, \$11.22, stationery; Members of Board of Health \$2 each.

The reeve's orders were issued on the treasurer to pay as follows, viz:—Jeffrey Artley, \$2.50, repairing road scraper; James McClung, \$3.50, work on side-line 18 and 19; J. L. Wilson, \$50, grant to Agricultural Society; A. T. Buehanan, \$2, drawing deeds; Joseph Sparling, \$2, statute labor charged in error; Henry Hurd, 80 cents, work on road; J. Thompson, \$1.25, ditching on 12 and 18 side-line; George Logan, \$15.90, ditching and culvert; James Falls, \$5.50 as janitor of hall; Henry Hurd, \$66, to pay for land taken for road; John Blain, \$32.50, work on 8 and 4 side-road, con. 10; Thomas Londry, \$3.75, work on 18 and 19 side-line; J. D. Crabtree, \$3, special services; J. Struthers, \$3, services on union school business; B. Dunlop, clerk, \$150, balance of salary, postage and freightage.

The treasurer was instructed to pay to members of council as indemnity for all kinds of services throughout the year as follows, viz:—

J. Boyd, councillor..... 76 20
H. Hurd, councillor..... 68 20
W. Shephardson, councillor... 61 60

On motion being made and seconded the council arose.
