McFadyen, paid; Donald McLean, acct. \$25, for keep and care of J. McFadyen for 12 days and 13 nights, paid; J. R. Sing, acct. \$2, services committing J. McFadyen, paid; W. Hicks, D. K. Preston, D. A. Hudson—McIntyre—That the Collector be instructed to collect taxes on lot 1, con. 14, less \$2 for statute labor returned unperformed, but performed by John Paul.—Carried.

McIntyre—Taylor—That the Collector be instructed to collect taxes from James Lloyd, less \$5.80, being arrears of taxes on lot 51, con. 1 S., for 1882.—Carried.

Speers—Hudson—That the Collectors' time for returning their rolls be further extended to the next meeting of council.—Carried.

Hudson—Speers—That the several D. R. Officers be paid \$3 each, and the several halls for Councils Meeting and Election be paid for at the rate of \$1 for each meeting, viz., O. H., Maxwell, \$3; J. Allison, \$1; O. H., Feversham, \$2; R. McGirr, \$2; O. H., Singhampton, \$3; Neil McLean, \$1; J. McCutcheon, \$2; and W. Milne putting up nomination and election notices and delivering ballots and ballot boxes, \$6; J. Madill messenger for hall key, \$1, and that the Reeve issue orders for the several amounts.—Carried.

By-Laws were passed appointing Charles McLean and Michael Curts, Auditors and Thomas Gamey Assessor.
