A grant feature in the A. O. U. W. is the Relief Society which has recently been added to the organization, which entitles its members to from \$900 to \$1,200, according to age. Out of this sum he can draw, in case of sickness, or accident causing dissability, \$10 per week, or in case a member is totally disabled he can draw \$300 a year for three years, the balance, if any, to be paid at his death. This does not affect the A. O. U. W. certificate of \$2,000, but is separate, the members having the privilege of taking advantage of this are daily coming in with their ploughs new and valuable feature, the admission fee being only \$5. The Relief Society, though connected with the A. O. U. W., is self-sustaining. Every member should post himself on the working of the Relief Society.
