A Few Words on the Potato Rot.

A grave word of caution needs to be spoken

on the subject of potate-growing this year.

There seems to be no doubt that the disease which attacked the crop last season was the genuine potato rot. We have in a previous number of The Rural fully explained the nature of that disease, and we give some hints on the best means of dealing with it. There is a great danger of it spreading over a wider area of country this year, and of its proving far more destructive than hitherto. But with the exercise and care and judgment on the part of farmers, we think it is possible to stay the disease to some extent—to keep it '86. from running riot ever the land. A few membered. One is, that the disease is of the zomatic class; by which is meant that it is infectious. It spreads from plant to plant, and from field to field, by minute germs carried by the wind, or it may be in some portion of the plant itself; and these germs falling upon a healthy plant communicate to it the disease. Another is, that those germs may survive the winter in the tops of the potato, as well as in the tuber itself, with unimpaired vitality, and their growth and development will begin just as soon as they are placed in the favourable conditions; in other words. as soon as they come into con- 50c, and \$1.00 per bottle. tact with the potato plant in a moist on growing state.
